Retired U.S. Rep. Ed Jenkins dies at 78

Former 9th District Congressman remembered for standing up for constituents

The people of the North Georgia Mountains have lost one of their nearest and dearest friends.

Retired 9th District U.S. Congressman Ed Jenkins died on New Year's Day at Piedmont Hospital in Atlanta at the age of 78 from an extended illness.

Visitation is scheduled for 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Friday, at Cagle Funeral Home in Jasper.

Funeral services are scheduled for 11 a.m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church of Jasper. Rep. Jenkins will lie in state at Antioch Baptist Church of Blairsville from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

Graveside services are scheduled for 3 p.m. at Antioch Church Cemetery with full military honors.

The Blairsville native,

born in Young Harris, graduated from Union County High School in Blairsville in 1949. Jenkins went on to graduate from Young Harris College and the University of Georgia School of Law. He became a lawyer in 1958.

Jenkins served on the legal staff of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the late 1950s; later as an aide to U.S. Congressman Phil Landrum; and spent the early 1960s as a prosecutor for the U.S. Attorney's Office.

In 1976, Jenkins, a Democrat and a veteran of the U.S. Coast Guard, was elected to the 9th District Congressional Seat as successor to Rep. Landrum.

Rep. Jenkins represented the 9th Congressional District of Georgia for 16 years until his retirement from Congress in 1993. During his years of Congress-

Lady Indians take third in BOS

The 18th Annual Battle of the States Christmas Tournament is in the books and the Towns County Lady Indians took home the tournament's third place trophy.

The Lady Indians took a hard fought 52-48 win in the first round over Polk County, Tenn.

Gabby Arencibia led the Lady Indians in scoring for the game with 19 points but she had lots of help with other leaders being Eryn Cochran and Lindsay Patton with 8 each, Kelsie Cowart with 7, and Ali Bleckley with 6. Arencibia also took the lead in assists with 4 with Bleckley close behind with 3, according to your reporter's unofficial tally.

The win vaulted the Lady Indians into a semi-final match up with last year's champion Gordon Lee. The Lady Trojans entered the game with a 10-1 record with the lone loss coming on opening night to Class AAAAA Kennesaw Mountain.

The Lady Trojans, who claimed the Battle of the States' first-place trophy last year, claimed the meeting of the Lady Trojans and Lady Indians again in 2011, this time by a 72-61 score.

Cochran scored a

Indians take third at Classic

Colliers take gold along with Hoffman; youngsters come up big

Dawsonville - The Towns County Indians grapplers captured third place in the 28th Annual Amicalola Classic.

The two-day tournament held at the Ford Phillips Center in Dawsonville featured gold medals for Aaron Collier at 106 pounds, Tim Collier at 138 pounds and Tyler Hoffman at 170 pounds.

Jonathan Owenby and Zach Stroud earned silver medals at 113 pounds and 152 pounds respectively.

Austin Stephens and Kyle Davis earned bronze medals at 145 pounds and 182 pounds respectively. Lane Kimsey took home a fourth place finish at 160 pounds while Bradley Smith brought home a fifth place finish at 195 pounds.

It was the best showing of the season for the Indians as they prepare for

"It's the best we've wrestled all year, by far," Coach Jeff Stowers said. "What can you say about the kids, man, they wrestled their tails off. They've really made a difference."

The Indians also welcomed back Tim Collier

from the ranks of the injured.

"He's been banged up for a while. We've got to get him back into wrestling shape, but he looked great over the weekend," Coach Stowers said. "He experienced some fatigue against Murphy on Thursday, but he handled the Classic really well."

The Indians are still banged up. Vonya Baldwin,
