Lady Indians breeze past Athens Christian, Prince Avenue game postponed

For the second time this season, the Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team took an easy victory over Athens Christian, this time on the Lady Eagles' home court in Athens. The victory set the stage for what would have been a showdown for first place in Region 8A with Prince Avenue on Friday in the Towns County Gym. That event would not materialize, however, as the Prince Avenue game was postponed until Saturday, February 13, due to snow and ice here in the mountains.

The Lady Indians' victory in Athens extended their overall record to 14-5 and their region record to 8-2. Prince Avenue would have entered the Friday game with a region record of 8-1 with the loss having been at the hands of the Lady Indians back in December in Bogart. The Lady Indians had no game scheduled for Saturday night but Prince Avenue continued a string of close victories with a 41-39 win at Athens Academy for a sparkling overall record of 18-1 and 9-1 in the region. Hebron Christian at this writing holds a slight edge over the Lady Indians for second place

in the region with a 14-4 overall record and 9-2 in the region.

The postponed game leaves the Lady Indians with three games for this week and three for next week, the final week of the regular season. If the Lady Indians and Prince Avenue win their remaining games prior to that final confrontation on February 13, the Lady Indians would need a win for a tie for first place for the regular season Region 8A Championship. A Lady Indian victory, however, would give them the top seed for the Region 8A Tournament as that would give them the tie breaker with two wins over Prince.

As for the Athens Christian game, the Lady Indians entered that contest with the unfortunate knowledge that Senior Kerri Ahernathy has been lost for the season due to a knee injury sustained in the game at Hayesville three nights earlier. It is especially difficult for Ahernathy, her family, teammates, and fans as she has endured hardship in each of her three years as a regular on the Lady Indian Varsity. She was slowed during her sophomore year while recovering from knee surgery and had an excellent

season as a junior interrupted by a lengthy bout with mononucleosis. Fortunately, she is not expected to need surgery for the injury this year to the other knee.

It required Lindsay Patton just forty one seconds to give the Lady Indians a lead they would never relinquish on a three point play and the sophomore added five more points for a 7-2 Towns lead by the 5:58 mark of the first quarter. Four other Lady Indians then put points on the scoreboard for a 19-7 Lady Indians lead after one quarter and a rousing 21-9 run the final 6:20 of the second quarter would give them a 40-19 lead at intermission.

Patton's fellow sophomore Ali Bleckley poured in eleven points in that second quarter for fifteen at the half while Patton not only wound up with eleven points for the half but also handed out three assists in the second quarter. Patton added six points in the third quarter as the Lady Indians extended their lead to 54-29, ending on a drive and pull-up jumper by Bleckley.

That Bleckley basket would be the start of her having a hand in fifteen of the

Lady Indians' final seventeen points as well as triggering an 11-0 run. A trey by Bleckley just nineteen seconds into the fourth quarter continued the run which gave them a 63-29 lead by the 6:26 mark with the Lady Eagles closing the final margin to 69-47 during the final 6:19 of the game. Freshman Dadrrian Blythe put ten points on the board the final quarter with Bleckley assisting on all five of those baskets.

Providing the scoring for the Lady Indians were Bleckley with 22 points, Patton with 17, Blythe with 12, Melissa Conrad with 8, and Gabby Arencibia and Jordan Moss with 5 each. Leading in assists were Bleckley with 6, Patton with 4, and Arencibia with 3. Remarkably, the Athens Christian Ladies recovered from the pounding by the Lady Indians by continuing a pattern of giving other region leaders all they can handle in taking Hebron Christian to overtime before falling 60-54 on Saturday in Athens. They had lost at Hebron by just a 48-47 score and at home by just a 45-41 score to Prince Avenue in games played earlier this month.

When a sports team faces a difficult match up such as was the case for the Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team against an ultra quick opponent at Athens Christian last

Tuesday, the last thing the team wants to have happen is ice cold shooting. Unfortunately, that was the case for the Indians in that game, however, as their goal seemingly had a lid on it with the Eagles scoring the first

nineteen points of the game and holding a 19-3 lead after one quarter. A trey by DJ Rogers got the Indians on the scoreboard in the closing seconds of the quarter.

Bradley Swanson came alive for the Indians in the second quarter, putting nine points on the scoreboard but that would be all of the points the Indians could manage with Athens Christian holding a commanding 42-12 lead at intermission. Swanson added four of six Indian points in the third quarter as the Eagles led 58-19 at quarter's end and six Indians then put points on the scoreboard in the fourth as Athens Christian closed out a 76-29 victory.

Basketball can be a puzzling and humbling game as a result of varying match ups as in the Lady Indians' dominance of an often quite competitive Athens Christian team as described in a separate article. As in that case, how else other than match ups can one explain Athens Academy defeating Athens Christian 52-49 on the Athens Academy court five days prior to defeating the Indians by just a 54-45 margin on the same floor?

Against Athens Christian, the Indians were led in scoring by Swanson with 14 points and Rogers with 5 while Devin Henderson led in assists with 2.

That was the case last Tuesday for the Towns County Lady Indian JV's basketball team as they traveled to Athens Christian and brought home a 36-20 victory for a 7-3 record.

Athens Christian overcame early 1-0 and 4-2 Lady Indian leads to take an 8-4 advantage by the 1:14 mark of the first quarter but followed up on the six straight points by having shooting problems of their own and going scoreless until sinking a 3-pointer at the 4:14 mark of the third quarter.
