Indians defeat Tallulah and Riverside; lose a close one to Lakeview

The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team put two games in the win column last weekend and didn't miss by much making it a three

game sweep for the week.

They traveled to Tallulah Falls on Tuesday and came away with a 63-47 victory before returning home on Friday and Saturday for a split deci-

Lakeview Academy of Gainesville pulled away in the final minutes of play for a 57-47 win on Friday before the Indians squeezed out a 48-45 victory over Riverside Military Academy of Gainesville on Sat-

All three games were Region 8-A contests with the Indians completing the week with an overall 5-19 record, including 3-10 in the region. TALLULAH FALLS -

The home standing Indians of Tallulah Falls showed significant improvement since falling to the Towns Indians in Hiawassee by a 67-27 score on December 7. After Bradley Swanson more than matched an early Tallulah field goal with a trey at 5:55 of the first quarter for a 3-2 Towns lead, Tallulah went on a 12-4 run for a 14-7 lead with 2:10 on the clock which became 16-12 after one

Towns Indians seemed to take control of the game at the start of the second quarter, going on a 12-0 run for a 26-16 lead by the 3:20 mark and pretty much maintaining the margin until intermission, taking a 30-22 lead to the dress-Swanson provided the

highlights of the first quarter with five points with DJ Rogers and Devin Henderson taking the lead in the second with ten and six points respectively. A runner by Henderson got the Indians even 16-16 at 6:12 of the second quarter and Rogers got them ahead, for good as it turned out, on a field goal at

Tallulah would go quietly, however, as they opened the third quarter with a 10-2 run for just a 33-32 deficit by the 4:54 mark. It required just thirteen seconds after that, however, for a Ryan Tallent basket to trigger an 8-0 run and an overall 12-2 surge for Towns leads of 41-32 at the 3:04 mark and a 45-34 by quarter's end. Tallent added a second basket and Swanson scored four points in the eight point portion of the

Towns would lead by as many as seventeen points and no less than ten during the fourth quarter when they closed out the 63-47 victory. Five points by Rogers and four each by Brandon Henderson and Swanson led the fourth quarter effort as the Indians took their long awaited fourth win of the

Rogers led a well balanced scoring attack for the Indians with 17 points with other leaders being Swanson with 13, Devin Henderson with 12, Brandon Henderson with 9, and Brett Bradshaw with 6. Leaders in assists were Devin Henderson with 4 and Brandon Henderson with 2.

LAKEVIEW EMY – The Indians got off to a good start against Lakeview Academy on Friday with Brett Bradshaw giving them a 1-1 tie and 3-1 and 5-3 leads by the 4:23 mark of the first quarter and a Bradley Swanson trey giving them an 8-6 lead at 3:35.

The Lions then used a 9-1 run for a 15-9 lead by the one minute mark but it required a late trey by Lakeview for them to hold a 19-13 lead after one quarter following 4 for 4 free throw shooting by the Indians.

DJ Rogers almost single handedly kept the Indians close in the second quarter with seven points as they pulled to within 24-22 with 1:19 left before the Lions closed out the scoring for the quarter again, with five points this time, for a 29-22 lead at the half. A seven point third quarter by Swanson and a field goal by Rogers at the 1:15 mark had the Indians within 36-33 but a putback by the Lions with thirty four seconds left had them holding a 38-33 lead entering the fourth quarter.

The Lions got a pair of 10-point leads near the midpoint of the fourth quarter but the Indians continued to threaten as Brandon Henderson reduced each of those leads to eight with field goals and Swanson closed the gap to 48-43 with three free
