Indians narrowly miss getting upset win over Athens Academy

The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team overcame early problems with turnovers and battled the Athens Academy Spartans to the closing seconds last Tuesday in the Towns County Gym before losing a heartbreaker by a 46-45 score. Exceptionally effective defensive play by the Indians was overshadowed by the early turnovers which allowed the Spartans to lead by as much as ten points on two occasions in the second quarter. The Indians were actually able to exploit the Spartans' back court pressure later in the game by breaking the press for several easy baskets.

The first quarter was close all the way with a pair of 3-pointers by John Bleckley offsetting three Spartan deuces off Indian turnovers. The Indians took what would turn out to be their only lead of 3-0 on Bleckley's first trey and they forced three ties before trailing 11-9 after one quarter.

The Spartans sprang out to a 19-9 lead and then a 23-13 advantage at the 3:06 mark of the second quarter with three Athens baskets following turnovers and another resulting when a Spartan lost control of the ball while falling down and it found its way into the basket. After this point, the Indians largely avoided turnovers and held the Spartans scoreless for

more than five and a half minutes until the 5:26 mark of the third quarter.

The Indians closed to within 23-18 by intermission and could have pulled closer but sank just three of seven free throw attempts during this span of time. After the Spartans took a 25-18 lead at the end of their scoring drought, the Indians rallied to within one point on three occasions behind a trey and two deuces by Bradley Swanson by the end of the third quarter and trailed by just 35-32 at quarter's end. The Indians twice closed to within one point on four for four free throw shooting by Swanson by the 6:27 mark of the fourth quarter but Athens held the lead and seemed safely ahead 42-37 on two free throws at 49.4 seconds.

The Indians weren't through, however, as they sandwiched a Brett Bradshaw basket and two more free throws by Swanson around a single Spartan free throw for just a 43-41 deficit at 9.2 seconds. Athens sank the second of two free throws at 8.6 seconds for a 44-41 score but sent Swanson to the line again at 6.1 seconds.

The sharp shooting junior sank his seventh straight free throw of the quarter for just a 43-42 deficit but purposely shot the next one short and just missed retrieving the ball for a possible tying field goal. The Spartans sank two free throws

at 4.2 seconds with the second bouncing around the rim before falling in the basket and becoming the winning point when DJ Rogers sank a trey at the buzzer for a final score of 46-45. The Rogers trey pulled the Indians to within one point for the sixth time in the last half and they had chances on several occasions to take the lead but couldn't quite connect to overcome the early ten point leads.

Despite the loss, the near upset can be considered a quite formidable home court debut as varsity Indians head coach for Ken Hamilton, who was recently elevated to that position after just over a year and a half as an Indians assistant varsity coach and head JV coach. He

52-23 victory at Tallulah Falls.

The Lady Indians required nearly half a quarter to get their game together, following an early 4-0 deficit with ten straight points for a 10-4 lead which became just 10-9 after a late first quarter trey and an early second quarter deuce. Patton then sank deuces before, between, and following a trey each by Arencibia and Bleckley for a 12 run and a 22-9 Towns lead by the 5:08 mark of the second quarter.

When the Lady Spartans countered with a 9-2 run for just a 24-18 deficit, the Lady Indians finished with steals by

Arencibia and Brittany Walls during the final minute for an Arencibia basket and a three point play by Melissa Conrad and a 29-18 lead at intermission. The Lady Indians broke the game open the last half, twice leading by twenty five points at 50-25 late in the third quarter and 59-34 midway through the fourth in coasting to the 64-41 victory.

Scoring leaders for the Lady Indians for the game were Arencibia with 20 points, Patton with 17, Bleckley with 13, Jordan Moss with 7, and Conrad with 5. Arencibia and Moss tied for the lead in assists with 6 each. The Lady Spartans had allowed an average of just thirty six points per game and more than forty six points just one time in a 55-20 loss to Holy Innocents, the state's ninth ranked team, back in late December. The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team let an important Region 8A game at Athens Academy get away from them on January 21 but dominated the Lady Spartans in a home court 64-41 victory last Tuesday. Three Lady Indian sophomores—Gabby Arencibia, Lindsay Patton, and Ali Bleckley—combined for fifty points in the impressive win.

The victory extended the Lady Indians' overall record to 15-5 and their region record to 9-2. Of great importance, they took over second place in regular season region play from the Hebron Christian Ladies who dropped to an 8-3 region record with a 51-42 loss at Social Circle the same night. Prince Avenue continued to hold first place with a 10-1 record after a

time action. Each of the seven contributed at least four points to the decisive win over Hebron Christian.



The Lady Indians finished the week with an overall record of 17-5 and in second place in Region 8A with an 11-2 record, one game behind Prince Avenue Christian. The Lady Indians and Prince entered this final week of the regular season with three games remaining, including a confrontation on Saturday in the Towns County Gym. A sweep of the three games by either team would give that squad top seeding in the region tournament scheduled for next week. A sweep would further assure Prince of the outright

regular season region title but the Lady Indians would only be assured of a tie for first place. If neither team earns a sweep for the week, a variety of outcomes are possible with Prince having a bit more margin for error with the one game lead entering the week, depending on the outcomes of the Tuesday and Friday games.

Lakeview slowed the Saturday game down at the start but the Lady Indians appeared to be taking control of the game with a 9-0 lead by the 3:36 mark of the first quarter. The Lady Lions rallied to within 11-7 by quarter's end, however, and took three small and brief leads between the 5:18 and 2:21 marks of the second quarter. The Lady Indians quickly overcame all three leads on a three point play by Dadrian Blythe, a trey by Brittany Walls, and a deuce by Jordan Moss and held a 29-26 lead at intermission.

The Lady Indians used an 11-2 run between the 5:20 and 2:25 marks of the third quarter to extend a 29-28 lead to 40-30 with Gabby Arencibia ending the run by taking the ball coast to coast for a layup and then coming up with a steal near mid court and sinking a 3-point bas-

ket. The Lady Lions responded with a 9-0 run for just a 40-39 deficit by the 7:24 mark of the fourth quarter but a pair of Conrad field goals led the Lady Indians out to a 47-41 lead with 3:38 on the clock.

The Lady Indians would leave the door open, however, by sinking just one of six free throw attempts between the 1:59 and 24.6 seconds mark with Lakeview treys at the 1:44 and eleven second marks suddenly giving them a 48-48 tie.

The Lady Indians called time out and exploited the Lady Lions' decision to apply full court pressure much as in a late game victory at Social Circle three weeks earlier. Moss inbounded the ball to Arencibia who in turn returned it to Moss who dribbled to mid court and found Patton open for the winning basket as time expired, giving a large Homecoming crowd a heart stopping victory.

Patton led the Lady Indians in scoring for the game with 20 points while other leaders were Arencibia, Conrad, and Moss with 8 each. Moss provided 7 assists, giving her sixteen in the two weekend games and twenty two for the week.

The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team continued a pattern of late rallies for potential victories in recent games against Lakeview Academy last Saturday in the TCHS Gym, trailing by just a 40-34 score by the two minute mark of the third quarter. Nothing much went right for the Indians the final ten minutes of what might be described as a wild and wooly game, however, as the Lions broke away for a 60-40 victory.
