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sion because of more filings in child support cases, foreclosures and a myriad of other cases.

Seabaugh, the lone sponsor of SB 485, determined the judgeships to be eliminated in the 16 circuits after evaluating the number of cases filed per judge.

"Those areas which only have two judges will not be reduced," Seabaugh said. "In many areas, the average workload of Superior Court judges is 3,200 cases. The judgeships to be eliminated averaged approximately 1,200 cases per judge. Those cases will be disbursed among the remaining judges in that circuit."

Seabaugh is suggesting eliminating an Enotah judgeship in a circuit that covers four counties — Towns, Union, White and Lumpkin. The circuit already has a critical backlog of cases yet to be heard between the three existing judges.

"In this budget atmosphere, nobody is exempt from

cuts," Seabaugh said. "If we can find significant savings in areas where we can consolidate, those are cuts we won't have to make to education. This is an initial proposal. I'm asking for input from the courts to ensure that the right judgeships are eliminated."

According to Seabaugh, the 2010 Fiscal Budget is more than 7 percent lower than the 2009 budget and it is 8.5 percent lower than Gov. Perdue's original 2010 budget estimate.

"Every department's budget has been affected by budget cuts, including Natural Resources, the Forestry Commission and the State Accounting Office and Administrative Services," Seabaugh said.

The number of Superior Court judges has increased each year for the past several budget cycles, according to Seabaugh.

"This legislation proposes to scale back in circuits where the number of cases has gone down," he said.

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"I got together with the Industrial Authority and they agreed to lease unused property for the use of temporary athletic fields."

Commissioner Kendall, Authority Chairman Morris Phillips, the entire Industrial Authority Board, as well as Wes Hooper, Towns County Recreation Director, met in February to discuss the potential of Park property as a temporary fix for the need of athletic fields for Towns County youth.

All expressed their full support for the temporary project based on the need for athletic fields to support local recreation athletic endeavors.

Commissioner Kendall said that since it is

essential for the Park property to be retained to bring much-needed industry and jobs to Towns County, the conversion from commercial real estate to ball fields will only be temporary.

Kendall and his predecessor, the late Towns County Sole Commissioner Jack Dayton, have tried unsuccessfully for years to acquire property from the TVA and the U.S. Forest Service to be used for athletic fields and recreational purposes.

Commissioner Kendall expressed his appreciation to the Industrial Authority Board of Directors for having the insight to be able to allow the property temporarily to be used for recreational purposes.
