Former Sen. Schaefer murdered in Habersham

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Nancy Schaefer, the former state senator in Georgia Senate District 50, representing Towns County, is dead, the victim of an apparent murder-suicide.

Georgia Bureau of Investigation spokesman John Bankhead said that the investigation into the death of Sen. Schaefer, 73, and her husband, 74-year-old Bruce Schaefer concludes that it was a murder-suicide.

The GBI and Habersham County Sheriff's Office conducted the investigation, Bankhead said.

The couple was discovered in the bedroom of their home in Turnerville, in rural Habersham County by relatives late Friday afternoon. A gun was found near the body of Bruce Schaefer,

Bankhead said.

The investigation by the Habersham County Sheriff's Office and the GBI into the deaths of Nancy and Bruce Schaefer indicate that Bruce Schaefer shot his wife once then turned the gun on himself, Bankhead said.

Several letters written by Bruce Schaefer to family members were found in the home including a suicide note, Bankhead said.

A GBI Medical Examiner determined that Sen. Schaefer died from a single

gunshot wound to the back and that Bruce Schaefer died from a single gunshot wound to the chest. To date, the investigation and autopsy results have not uncovered any evidence to dispute that the tragedy is anything other than a murder-suicide, Bankhead said.

Authorities have reported that financial problems were mentioned in the suicide note left behind by Bruce Schaefer.

Sen. Schaefer's death was first announced on the floor of the Georgia House of Representatives Friday evening.

Sen. Schaefer, a two-term state senator in Georgia Senate District 50, was first elected to the state senate in 2004. She lost to current District 50 State Sen. Jim Butterworth in 2008.

Sen. Butterworth was shocked and extremely sad-

dened by the news of Sen. Schaefer's untimely death.

"This news hits the hearts of many in our community and I want to be among the first to express my deepest condolences to the family of Nancy and Bruce Schaefer," Sen. Butterworth said.

"The Schaefer's were a blessing to many who were privileged to know them. We are reminded that the Lord is near to the brokenhearted and as the Schaefer family mourns their loss, they can be assured that Amy and I will keep them in our prayers."

During her tenure in the state Senate, Sen. Schaefer sponsored legislation that supported retirees, families and educators. She also sponsored legislation that limited the sale of pseudoephedrine, a drug used in the manufacturing of meth-

amphetamine.

The legislation put products that contained pseudoephedrine behind retail store counters and limited the amount purchased by individuals to help crack down on the manufacturing of methamphetamine.

Sen. Schaefer and her husband Bruce Schaefer had been married 52 years and had five children. Funeral services were scheduled for 1 p.m. Wednesday at the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Toccoa, Acree-Davis Funeral Home announced on Monday.

A private burial will follow at Tallulah Falls Cemetery.

In lieu of flowers, the Schaefer family requests donations be made to the Nancy and Bruce Schaefer Scholarship Fund that will provide scholarships for under privileged youths.

Health Department jobs at stake

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Towns County Public Health workers are faced with the likelihood of some losing their jobs if the Georgia General Assembly calls for another cutback in public health budgets.

The Towns County Public Health Board of Directors met last week with District 2 Public Health Director Dr. David Westfall in Hiawassee to discuss the county's Fiscal 2011 budget.

Workers already are facing a loss of 10 percent of their annual salaries with another round of proposed furlough days per employee for the entire upcoming Fiscal year. Employees have already been furloughed one day a month. For the past three months, they've been furloughed two days a month. A proposal of continued two furlough days per month is on the table.

The cost savings for FY 2011 from two days a month of furloughs is expected to be \$22,405 for Towns County.

However, the county, which has increased its local funding of the Health Department by \$40,000 to \$178,000 for Fiscal 2011, is exhausting its existing health department fund balance because of the economic downturn.

Another bad year and

the county could be faced with a health department budget shortfall of \$68,579 by June 30, 2011, Dr. Westfall told Towns County board members last week.

That would leave Towns County with a fund balance of \$92,321, or one and a half months of operating cash flow entering Fiscal 2012. Health depart-

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Butterworth fights teacher furloughs

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District 50 State Sen. Jim Butterworth is fighting to protect Georgia's teachers from additional furlough days.

A measure cosponsored by Sen. Preston Smith (R-Rome) and Sen. Butterworth (R-Clarksville) would protect Georgia teachers from additional furlough days. The proposal prevents school systems with more than six percent funding in its reserve accounts from furloughing teachers, when funding is readily available to prevent the furloughs.

The state has exhausted a reserve account of almost \$1.8 billion over the last two years. Most of the reserve funding went to education spending.

"If funding is available on a local level that can protect our teachers from fur-

loughs, it seems common sense that these rainy-day funds should be used," said Sen. Butterworth. "Across the state there is more than \$1.2 billion sitting in local school system reserve funds. Simply put, that money should be used to support Georgia teachers."

Sen. Butterworth's presence and impact at the Gold Dome is increasing. He recently was appointed
