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### **Towns County Sports Memories**

tcherald@windstream.net This week's article completes coverage of the recently completed TCHS basketball season with a second trip down memory lane in recognizing family connections between current Lady Indians and Indians and some of the Towns County athletes of the past. This is in effect a continuation of an earlier article honoring Jordan Moss for reaching the 1,000 career scoring total and last week's memory lane article addressing the accomplishments of several previous teams aided immeasurably by relatives of 2011 TCHS basketball players.

This week's article acknowledges additional sports related accomplishments of the past by individuals connected by kinship to 2011 TCHS varsity and JV players. Readers are reminded again that acknowledging all family relationships of the current players would be endless in some cases with just a sampling of accomplishments and events possible within the confines of available newspa-

It is very likely that some individuals and events worthy of inclusion have been overlooked and apologies are extended for any such omissions. Anyone thinking of such a performance or event is invited to inform or remind your reporter for possible inclusion in a future article of this type. Headings for this week will include the names of basketball players from the 2011 season with sports memories brought about by their participation following

EMILY ANDERSON -The scorebook for his senior season of 1982 is missing but Michael Anderson was an ultra productive all around player for the Indians during that season when they captured the Sub-Region 8A North Tournament Championship in the Towns County Gym. The Indians won the tournament by taking a 92-61 win over Dawson County in the semi-finals and a 61-53 victory over Banks County in the

Actually the score sheets for the two sub-region tournament games and two regular season games are available with Michael averaging 12.8 points per game in those four games. Of course, he has served with distinction for many years as a coach in various sports for the youth of the county, including as the Indians JV coach and as an assistant on the Indians varsity during the 2011 Michael is the father of Lady Indian Sophomore Emily An-

ALI BLECKLEY - Lady Indian Junior Ali Bleckley followed in the footsteps of her mother, Cheryl Acree (Bleckley), and her uncle, Brent Acree, in playing basketball at TCHS. Chervl was a member of the Lady Indians varsity basketball team as a freshman and sophomore through the 1972 season while Brent was a three year member of the Indians varsity through his senior season of 1976 when he was a starter for much of that season, averaging 3.8 points and 3.6 rebounds per

ELIZABETH TURN-ER – Although no records are known to exist, Todd Turner was a member of the Indians varsity football and baseball teams in the late 1970's. He is the father of Lady Indian Freshman Elizabeth Turner and Todd's father, Ralph Turner, was the highly regarded and highly respected Towns County Recreation Director when the agency was initiated some forty

BRADSHAW - The Bradshaw Brothers, Senior Brett and Freshman Garrett, were born in metro Atlanta but moved to the home county of their grandfather, Clifford Bradshaw, Sr., several years ago where numerous relatives have made their mark in sports activity. Among the most prominent are great uncle James Bradshaw and cousin Sheri Bradshaw (Har-

James was not only a fine scorer with scoring averages of 11.7 and 14.0 points per game during his junior and senior years of 1968 and 1969 but he is remembered as a tenacious rebounder and defender as well. Sheri was also a fine all around performer and is especially remembered for reaching the 1,000 point career scoring total while averaging 8.0, 17.5, and 15.3 points per game her final three years through the 1993 season. The scorebook for her freshman year when she played a prominent role with the Lady

Indians is missing.

SLADE DAVENPORT Few Lady Indians or Indians can claim three direct ancestors who were prominent members of the Lady Indians and Indians basketball teams but Indian Freshman Slade Davenport is a perfect fit for this category. His mother, Jaclyn Welch (Davenport) was a prominent member of the Lady Indians Varsity as a freshman and sophomore during the 1992 and 1993 seasons, averaging 7.2 and 13.2 points per game during those years.

During the 1993 sea-

son, she tied the school single game scoring record of thirty six points under full court rules set by Amy Allen (Silvey) during the 1986 season. Of course, this record was surpassed by Nikki Winn with a 37-point game during the 2008 season with this record also falling to a 43-poing performance by Gabby Arencibia during the recently completed season.

Both of Jaclyn's parents, Ricky and Doris Moss Welch, were standout players at TCHS back in the early to mid seventies. Ricky was a three year starter for the Indians through his senior season of 1974, averaging 5.3, 6.9, and 7.4 points per game while being better known for his defensive and rebounding talents. He averaged 5.5, 7.9, and 6.6 rebounds per game during those years when his teams combined for forty seven victories, including the Sub-Region 8A North Tourna-ment Championship and the Indians overcame a 32-29 defi-Indians' first trip to the state cit for a 37-37 tie and another tournament in 1974.

te as a sophomore for the Lady Indians and then a top flight starter for two years prior to graduating as a sixteen year old senior in 1975. The Lady Indians compiled a 63-18 record during those three years and included two sub-region tournament championships and two state tournament appearances, when just two teams from each region made it to state, among their successes. Doris averaged 12.0 and 12.2 points per game as her team's second leading scorer during her two years as a starter. She averaged 2.5 rebounds per game while restricted to half court play as a forward under rover rules as a junior and then 5.3 rebounds per game while playing full court as a rover during her senior year. She placed second on her team in both rebounds and assists during that senior year after leading in assists as

The two teams then came face to face in the semi-finals of the Sub-Region 8A North Tournament at Banks County with the Lady Indians hoping to reach the sub-region tournament finals for an amazing fourteenth year in a row against the home standing Lady Leopards. Incredibly, a third overtime game would occur with the third time being the charm for the Lady Indians as they took a 43-41 victory. Donna scored seven points in that game with two coming on a field goal in the on an important free throw late Doris was the top sub- in the overtime period of the clutch win.

Donna is the mother of Freshman Stetson Hedden who made his varsity debut after promotion from the Indian JV's and scored his first varsity points on a late field goal against Prince Avenue in the Indians' Region 8A Tournament game at Commerce.

DEVIN HENDERSON -We fast forward now a couple of years to the 1987 season when the Lady Indians were looking this time to extend a streak of winning on opening night of the Sub-Region Tournament for an unprecedented eighteenth year in a row under veteran head coach Dion Eller. The Lady Indians had a tall order against Dawson County on this evening in the Towns County Gym after having fallen by a 67-49 score at Dawsonville in mid December and by a 75-52 score to the Lady Tigers at home in early

Making two free throws in such an atmosphere was quite remarkable for a sophomore making her first trip to the line in the quarter but Amy was up to the task in extending the Lady Indians' incredible string of opening night successes. Amy is the mother of Indians Senior Devin Henderson. Further, she is the daughter of 1960 TCHS graduate Jerry Sanders, a very promising young basketball player whose play was eventually restricted signifi-cantly by an injury to his shooting hand sustained in an automobile accident.

LUKE PARKER - After having been a capable but reluctant scorer as an impact defensive player and rebounder for the Lady Indians during her sophomore and junior seasons, Lana Brown (Parker) stepped forward as a senior during the 1987 Lady Indians season following the departure of nearly 3,300 career points by 1986 seniors Amy Allen (Silvey), Angela Rogers (Kendall), and Tonia Haney (Anderson). She averaged 13.9 points per game as the only senior in leading a very young squad to late season success after a very difficult start typical of such young and inexperienced teams against a

very challenging schedule. After a 1-14 start but with increasingly competitive contests, the Lady Indians avenged early season home court losses with late season victories at Banks County and Jackson County sandwiched around a second win over Rabun Gap at home for a 4-17 record entering the opening round game against Dawson County in the Sub-Region 8A Tournament described above. Lana included a field goal and 2 for 2 free throw shooting among 12 points for the game in the decisive fourth quarter in the win over Dawson

County. sixteenth straight trip to the sub-region tournament finals in the final year of Dion Eller's nineteen years as the Lady Indians Head Coach would not be possible as they fell to Commerce in the semifinals two nights later but Lana closed out her career with a twenty five point performance against the outstanding Lady Tigers team. Lana is the mother of Indians Sophomore Luke Parker.

DJ ROGERS - Maybe the most unique recognition of this series is that of JB McClure, Jr. of the TCHS Class of 1952 with the Indians scorebook for this season being the earliest for either the Lady Indians or Indians known to survive. JB was better known as Sonny Boy or Sonny and he led the Indians in scoring for that season with an average of 17.0 points per game for the twenty two games available with a few games at the end of the season apparently not included in the scorebook. He is the great, great uncle of Indians Senior DJ Rogers and a

long time resident of Michigan. In addition to the basketball scene, DJ has relatives with significant involvement in other
