Young Harris City Council approves height variance for YHC gymnasium

The Young Harris City Council met Tuesday, April 7, 2009 for their Regular Meeting. Present for the meeting were Mayor Andrea Gibby; City Council members Matthew Miller, Terry Ingram, Jennifer Mulkey, David Sellers, John Kelley and Donald Keys.

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by Gibby. A moment of silence was held in memory of Hazel Coker Nichols, who served as a council member for over 20 years and was a beloved member of the community.

John Walter Kelley, who won the March 17 city election, was sworn in by City Clerk Shirley Jarrard to fill the Council Post 6 position.

Young Harris College has applied for a variance pursuant to height restrictions set forth in Section 7.9 of Appendix A of the Zoning Code of Young Harris. They are asking that a variance be given allowing them to build a 59 foot high building instead of the 35 foot limit that is in the building ordinance. Young Harris College has complied with the

requirement of presenting the city with complete plans so that the city knows exactly why they are requesting the variance. YHC President Cathy Cox presented the mayor and council with information obtained from the Department of Community Affairs about the difference in the building requirements between that and a residential building. She also noted that the building will be inspected by the State Fire Marshall.

A motion was made by Donald Keys to grant the variance; Matt Miller seconded the motion and opened it for discussion which included their plans for parking and fire and res-

cue situations.

Council member Jennifer Mulkey noted that she did not think the motion was complete enough to protect the city. A motion was made by Matthew Miller to amend the original motion to incorporate the Plans dated 03/22/09, prepared by Paul Flippo of Eberly and Associates into the minutes by reference as the Plans that are to be used in association with this variance. If any change orders are issued that pertain to the height variance issued by the City of Young Harris, Young Harris College must return to the city council for approval. In

Bringing tourism back to Towns

Nothing attracts a crowd like a crowd.

The Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds is trying to put this philosophy into practice by bringing local businesses together in hopes of building local tourism during 2009.

Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds general manager Hilda Thomason called a meeting last Thursday that was attended by Hiwassee Mayor Barbara Mathis, representatives from two banks, and local hotel managers to discuss promoting tourism in Towns County. The meeting was only the first of many to organize hotels, restaurants, banks, municipalities, the media, and all other entities that could benefit from the tourist trade locally.

One major item discussed at the meeting was a pep rally for local businesses on May 4 at 6:30 p.m.

Thomason hopes to get a good turnout at the event, so that businesses can come together to help one another.

Thomason said she wants to include everyone possible in the promotion of local tourism, including the rotary club, Ingles, the schools, and the real estate market, which many said was benefited by the fairgrounds during the develop-

ment boom.

As far as spreading the word about upcoming events, there was a lot of talk about the fairground's website, www.georgiamountainfairgrounds.com, and the creation of links that would promote various hospitality services in the county. Right now the website is getting a reported 15,000 hits a month.

Council ready to unveil EMA Plan

Hiwassee City Council members will get their first look at the 2009 Emergency Management Plan next month, City Manager Rick Stancil said.

Stancil said that two readings before council would be required before the EMA plan could be adopted by council members.

Emergency management planning involves preparing for disaster before it occurs.

In other business, the council voted to deny an adjustment of sewer bills for

car washes. The owner of Cash Gas, Rudy Roach had spoken with Mayor Barbara Mathis about the extravagant sewer bills imposed on car washes. According to Roach, the more water used at the business' car wash, the higher the sewer bill. He felt an adjustment of the bill was in order. The council felt otherwise.

Meanwhile, council members learned that the city could be in line for \$535,000 in federal stimulus money for sewer system rehabilitation. The local match would be 35 percent,
