Council ready to unveil EMA Plan

Hiawassee City Council members will get their first look at the 2009 Emergency Management Plan next month, City Manager Rick Stancil said.

Stancil said that two readings before council was in order. The council felt would be required before the EMA plan could be adopted by council members.

In other business, the council voted to deny an adjustment of sewer bills for

car washes. The owner of Cash Gas, Rudy Roach had spoken with Mayor Barbara Mathis about the extravagant sewer bills imposed on car washes. According to Roach, the more water used at the business' car wash, the higher the sewer bill. He felt an adjustment of the bill otherwise.

Meanwhile, council members learned that the city could be in line for \$535,000 in federal stimulus money for sewer system rehabilitation. The local match would be 35 percent,
