abuse of prescription drugs.

The educational sessions at the conference were conducted by prescription drug diversion experts Landon Gibbs and Ritch Wagner with the Law Enforcement Liaison & Education (LELE) department at Purdue. Gibbs and Wagner have close to 30 years of law enforcement experience specializing in prescription drug diversion and general criminal investigations.

Elements of the educational program included drug identification, lawful prescribing, helping law enforcement officers spot diversion of medications and interacting with neigh-

boring law enforcement agencies to report pharmacy robberies and identify suspects. Gibbs, Wagner and Sheriff Clinton also discussed how illegal trafficking and abuse of medications can create problems for people who have a legitimate need for these medicines.

The sessions highlighted the RxPATROL(r) program. RxPATROL(r) is a data collection system developed and funded by Purdue to collect, analyze and disseminate information on pharmacy thefts in order to assist law enforcement efforts to apprehend suspects and to help pharmacists guard against robberies and burglaries.
