'It's a miracle' recent TCHS grad survives crash

Eighteen-year-old Matthew Kerr doesn't remember much about what happened on Friday. In fact, gency Services workers used he can't even remember his first helicopter ride.

However, when he walked out of Greenville Memorial Hospital in Greenville, SC on Saturday morning, the recent Towns County High School graduate was feeling lucky to be alive.

Prior to his first helicopter ride, Kerr was driving his red Ford Escort and preparing to pull out of 288 Georgia Macedonia Baptist Church onto Georgia 76 shortly before 2 p.m.
