Towns County lawyer takes on TOPIX posters again

The attorney, who won a record \$404,000 lawsuit against an individual posting libelous comments on a TOPIX forum and making slanderous statements against a Union County man, has filed a suit on behalf of another local victim of Internet libel.

Russell Stookey is representing Pat Long, of Fannin County, whose business is Pat's Kountry
