purple and gold, but some irritating verbiage accompanied the school colors of the Union County Panthers. The letters "UC," a paw print and a promise for Friday night's game with rival Union County were emblazoned on the *Senior Stone*. It was a simple statement, but the message was loud and clear: "we're coming to get some Friday night."

The sight of the disgraced and besmirched *Rock* made Meier's jaw drop initially.

"Yes sir, it made me mad, my jaw dropped," said Meier, team leader and possibly the most versatile athlete on the Indians' team. "I was pretty upset about it actually. I'd say that gave this team 95 percent more motivation for practice this week.

"I told this team to remember that image," Meier said. "That's the heaviest bulletin board you'll ever see. Whoever did it, well, it was a mistake on their part. That has to be the greatest motivating factor I've ever experienced in my years of playing high school football.

"We'll deal with this on the football field on Friday night," Meier said.

Indians' Head Football Coach Kyle Langford said he really hadn't paid much attention to the redecorated *Rock* on Monday.

"I'll have to be honest with you, I really didn't even notice it," he said. "I know folks say Union and Towns is

a big rivalry, but for us, it's really not much of a rivalry. You have to win a few games to have a rivalry and that's something we just haven't done against Union County.

"That's a simple fact," he said. "If you don't beat people, then you can't call it a rivalry. I don't think they look at us as a rival because they've beaten us every time with one exception. One time doesn't mean you've done much, so we've got a lot of work to do this week before we take the field on Friday night.

"Don't get me wrong, I'd really like to call Union-Towns a rivalry, but to do that, we've got to win a football game," he said.

Langford didn't get a real good look at the graffiti. It wasn't there for long as TCHS Principal Roy Perren had the disgraceful message covered with blue spray paint.

Meanwhile, Indians' quarterbacks Zach Stroud and Jackson Noblet were just as insulted as Meier about the graffiti incident.

"You just don't do

that," said Stroud, a junior. "It ain't right. Billy's right, it's definitely a motivating factor for us on Friday night. We'll show up and do our best to come out of this with a win."

Noblet, a freshman, is new to the bright lights of Friday night football. Nevertheless, the gritty signal caller has his eyes focused on avenging the besmirching of *The Rock* on the football field.

"It motivates me and it makes me mad," he said. "It's going to make me play harder and better on Friday night. It gives me the motivation to go out there with a mission in mind. It's all about respect and it's time people begin to respect this football team."

Those are tall words coming from a freshman. But senior lineman Dylon Nelson said he'll give his quarterbacks the opportunity to make the best of the situation.

"Remembering the graffiti on *The Rock* will make the payback taste a little bit better on Friday night," he said. "I mean, why would they want to do that? I understand this is the first time we've played them in a while, but come on man, you just don't do stuff like that. You just don't."

Only time will tell if the Indians make good on their promise to avenge the besmirching of *The Rock*.

of aggressive dog means a canine on another person's property or on public property which exhibits aggressive behavior without provocation, placing that person in fear of personal well-being;

Injures or destroys property of another, including but not limited to

livestock and domestic animals;

Exhibits aggressive behavior toward animals, including but not limited to livestock and domestic animals, which are kept or domiciled on the property of another or while on public property.

The aggressive pack,

believed to have once numbered 14, and now around 10, is being trapped by order of Commissioner Kendall.

"We've got to do something before we're reporting that a small child has been injured or killed by this pack of dogs," Commissioner Kendall said.
