Kicking game falters in 7-6 squeaker

It was a game of inches, flags, miss opportunities and unusual kicking results but in the end, the Copper Basin Cougars held on by a claw to take the 7-6 win back to Tennessee. A missed extra point, field goal and of all things, a 70yd punt that went into the end zone spelled the one point difference. The opening squib KO was returned to the 30yd line by John Bleckley then he tucked a John Swilley pass for a first down. Swilley then took the ball off right guard for another first across mid-field. After a no-call jersey grab on Mat Hogsed, he then ran a button hook reception for the first down to the Cat 34yd line. The Indians switched OBs and Mat Hogsed ran a keeper to the 15yd line. The Tribe stalled at the 10yd line and a missed opportunity on a field goal try gave the Cougars the ball at the 20yd line. Despite the missed FG, the Indians controlled the ball ten minutes of the first twelve to keep the potent Cougar offense off the field A pass attempt by the Cats was picked by Matt Beni but at the end of the quarter it was 0-0 as the tribe was forced to punt.

After the punt, Billy Meier, Taylor Denton and Landon Harris blew through the line for a huge 10 yd Cat loss. Josh Goodwin and Nic Rhoades tacked on another good "T" forcing a punt. Luck went sour again and the Cats picked an Indian pass to get the ball back. After a missed tackle, the Indians hauled the Cat runner down 20yds further down the field for their biggest gain of the night. After a 12yd sack on the previous play, at 5:31 the Cougars QB threw a wobbler to a wide open Cat scampering to the end zone and it was a 7-0 game. The second half would turn out to be much as the first, a defensive struggle with Joseph Hancock and Taylor Denton carrying much of the load in back and Landon Harris' Dylen Nelson and Josh Goodwin in the trenches. With the Cats moving up field it was Denton and Harris combining for a 9yd sack. During the last half, the stripes seemed predominately enamored with sideline rules rather than action on the field, flagging both teams with infringements. Landon Harris was a force on defense all night long and eventually had two sacks and eleven tackles in the game. On offense, a keeper by John Swilley and a pass completion to Billy Meier got firsts for the Indians. After a long first down run by Mat Hogsed was called back on a flag, Mat Beni, who had 75 yards on the night, charged for the first down at the 31yd line. After a stallout, the Cougars got the ball back but a 9yd sack by Billy Meier and friends set them back momentarily. A personal foul gave the Cats a first down at the 45yd line. The Tribe got a huge break when Devin Henderson split the seam to block a Cougar punt at the 22yd line

Matt Beni then hauled the pigskin to the 4yd line at the end of three innings.

At 11:07, Matt Beni broke left for the score but the x-point sailed array and it was 7-6. After much yellow laundry and re-kicks, the Cats got the ball up at the 42yd line. 
