

YHC men's tennis completes first tournament of the fall

MILLEDGEVILLE, Ga. Mitchell Midkiff's appearship match and Matt Howard's Flight C consolation crown highlighted Young Harris College's appearance at the Georgia College and State University Men's Fall Tennis Championships in Milledgeville this past weekend.

The Mountain Lions had three of the four semifinalists in Flight C, with Midkiff defeating teammate Koen Gottenbos 7-5, 6-1 in one semifinal. Midkiff was finally brought down in the championship match against GCSU's Bobby Angelucci 6-1, 6-3. Angelucci defeated YHC's Jordan Brannon 6-0, 6-0 in the

semifinals. In the consolation bracket of the same flight, Mountain Lions teammates Howard and Cole Crawford faced off for the consolation championship, with Howard taking home the crown with a 6-0, 6-3 victory. Howard defeated another teammate Jordan Johnson 6-1, 6-1 in the consolation semifinals.

YHC's Schraepen reached the semifiance in the Flight C champion- nals in Flight B, picking up wins over Jan Labas (7-6, 7-6) and Rafael Milhati (2-6, 6-4, 6-4), both of Augusta State, before falling to eventual champion Leo Bernardes of GCSU 6-0, 6-3. Jamie Childree also participated in Flight B, dropping his first match 6-2, 6-1 to Wu Ferraz of Augusta State and falling in a tiebreaker Gabor Szabo of Lees-McRae 4-6, 6-2, 10-5.

Childree and Midkiff teamed to give the Mountain Lions their top doubles result, reaching the semifinals of Flight B. The tandem picked up wins over Oxford-Emory's Ben Freedman and Ethan Protas by an 8-6 score and then defeated Andrew Bates and Corbett Smith of Lees-McRae 8-2 in the semifinals. Augusta State's Ferraz and Lipe Ramos finally ended the YHC team's run with an 8-2 victory over Childree and Midkiff in the

semifinals. The Mountain Lions are scheduled to return to action September 17 at North Georgia.
