Two charged in interstate crime spree

Hiwassee residents charged in Georgia and North Carolina for burglaries

Authorities in Towns County and Clay County, NC believe that they have solved a series of interstate burglaries dating back several months.

An investigation into the alleged activities of Judith Roberts Jones, 55, of Hiwassee, and Scott Larson Jones, 63, also of Hiwassee, has yielded stolen property taken from both Lake Chatuge communities, according to authorities.

The investigation into the series of burglaries continues and more details will be made available at a later date, according to the Towns County Sheriff's Office.

According to Towns County sheriff's reports, the joint probe began when Towns County Sheriff's Investigator Pat Williams contacted Clay County Sheriff's Office investigators regarding information that their agency had discovered

No millage rate increases in sight

Towns County residents can rest assured there will be no millage rate increases for the next year.

The Towns County Board of Education joined three other local governments on Monday night declaring that there will be no millage increase for the upcoming year.

"The board will work diligently to find additional ways to cut our expenses, conserve funds and preserve the integrity of the education we offer to our students," said Towns County BOE Chair Emily Phillips.

BOE Vice Chair Larry Kimsey said the board had to make tough decisions on cuts. However, he reiterated that every household in

Towns County has to do the same during the continued economic downward spiral.

"We need to make every effort possible to cut expenses before we go back to our community for additional tax revenue," Kimsey said. "Asking for additional taxes is never easy, but ex-

Crowded field in store for Senate District 50

Five-candidate field almost assures a runoff

Multiply Rick Austin and John Wilkinson by two, add one more.

Yes, the State Senate District 50 race has widened with five candidates seeking to fill the unexpired term of Jim Butterworth.

Add Curtis Burger, David Strickland, and Mary Beth Focer to the list of candidates seeking to become the next District 50 state senator.

Early voting for the Nov. 8 Special Election begins on Oct. 17, according to the Georgia Secretary of State's Office.

Burger, 40, is a Lavonia businessman; Strickland is a 51-year-old insurance agent from Royston; and Focer is a 45-year-old community volunteer from Hartwell.

The trio join Austin and Wilkinson in the race to replace Butterworth.

Austin, the former state representative from District 10 and Wilkinson, the former program manager for the agricultural education program in Georgia and

State FFA Advisor, both qualified to run for the District 50 State Senate vacancy on Oct. 3rd.

Kendall solo 'no' vote on T-SPLOST project list

Commissioner says 'vote for it or else' approach is flawed

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall was the lone 'no' vote among a 26-member Roundtable panel finalizing a projects list for a July 31 regional Transportation Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax vote.

If approved by voters throughout the 13-county region, Towns County would only what Georgia Department of Transportation officials have been promising for years along with a turning lane project on U.S. 76 paid for by the funds, while Hall and Forsyth counties would cash in on the projected \$1.26 billion estimated to be raised region-wide over a 10-year period. Both counties would collect about half of the estimated funds to be raised by the T-SPLOST.

Commissioner Kendall told fellow Roundtable panelists at the meeting last week in Clarkesville that the method of "vote for it or else" is flawed and should not be used to force voters

into approving the plan.

"It's set up to be voted on by each region," Commissioner Kendall said. "That way if one region votes it down, another region might approve it. Well, that's flawed. The referendum is not on the statewide ballot because the Georgia General Assembly wouldn't put it on the statewide ballot."

"That alone should tell you a little something about this whole thing," Commissioner Kendall said. "DOT
