The Towns County Indians hit a roadblock Friday night in Woodstock.

The roadblock came in the form of the River Ridge Knights on Homecoming night in Woodstock.

The Knights exacted some revenge on the Indians, making Towns County the sacrificial lamb for its 2011 Homecoming by a score of 42-6.

In 2010 Indians won the first ever meeting against the Knights at home with a 14-7 Homecoming victory.

Revenge was sweet for the Knights.

Things appeared to be going the Indians' way early on following a Knights' fumble.

The Indians mounted a long, sustained drive to start the game before stalling on a fourth down play deep in Knights' territory.

The Indians' defense held the Knights scoreless in the first quarter. In fact, throughout the first half, the Indians held the Knights to only two scores. River Ridge led 14-0 at the half.

The third quarter was all River Ridge as the Knights took control of the game. Almost in concert with several Indian miscues, the Knights amassed three more touchdowns to take a 35-0 lead into the final quarter.
