# College basketball returns to Towns County

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**Young Harris** – College basketball has returned to Towns County after a 41-year absence on the hardwood.

The Mountain Lions and Lady Mountain Lions split with their natural Peach Belt Conference rival North Georgia College and State University from Dahlonega.

On the court first at the "Valley of Doom," the Lady Lions dropped their season opener 64-39 despite a game-high 15-point effort from former Towns County Lady Indian Nikki Winn.

Led by freshman O'Neil Lubin's career high 26 points, the Mountain Lions took the nightcap with a 78-68 win over the Saints.

"What a fabulous way to kickoff basketball at Young Harris after 41 years," Young

Harris College President Cathy Cox said, referring to the win by Head Coach Pete Hermann's Lions. "It just doesn't get much better than this."

The event, aired via YHC Web cast and local television was filled with pomp and circumstance as 2,301 fans filled into the arena dubbed the "Valley of Doom" by Coach Hermann.

The game was capped during the Web cast by YHC freshman Ethan Burch, who called the game for Young Harris with an excited "Mountain Lions Win! Mountain Lions Win at the Valley of Doom!"

The games attracted alumni of the Luke Rushton era. It also brought home his son and former Towns County Indian basketball standout Eddie Rushton.

"Luke, the Lion" YHC's team mascot delighted the crowd with high-fives and

inspiring antics throughout the night.

Of course, the mascot's name was inspired by the legend of the college's legendary former coach and mentor. The college dedicated two courtside seats in honor of Luke Rushton and his wife June Rushton.

Their son, Eddie Rushton welcomed the players back that performed tirelessly for his father during his legendary coaching career at YHC.

"Thank you from my family, and I appreciate everybody that came here," Eddie Rushton told the crowd prior to the Mountain Lions matchup with the Saints Monday night. "I hope y'all will come back and renew this friendship that has been so long in coming."

"Young Harris College has meant a lot to me," he said. "President Cox and my good buddy Randy

Dunn (YHC Athletics Director) who I played college basketball with at North Georgia College, the honor that you have bestowed on me and my family tonight, I appreciate it."

Coach Luke Rushton and his teams won 407 games and lost only 167 from 1948 to 1969.

On this night, Luke Rushton's successor, Coach

Hermann, was choked with emotion and ecstatic following his team's victory over the rival Saints.

"I thought it was a great team effort," Coach Hermann said. "It's great for all the former players to come back and see. I'm very happy about the positive performance. This is just a great win for Young Harris College."

## TCHS basketball teams victorious

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If the season-opening scrimmage at Bill P. Kendall Gymnasium is any indication, Towns County basketball is in for a solid season.

The Lady Indians had five players in double figures, led by senior Jordan Moss with 17 points, in a dominating 79-21 victory over the Andrews Lady Wildcats out of North Carolina.

Junior Gabby Arencibia finished with 14, juniors Ali Bleckley and Ben Pong added 10 points each, as did sophomore Dadrion Blythe.

Leading 10-6 in the first quarter, the Lady Indians went on a 25-0 scoring run between the 2:51 mark of the first quarter and the 5:34 mark of the second for a 35-6 advantage.

They never looked back.

The scoring barrage included 17 consecutive points in closing out the first quarter with five 3-point bas-

kets included in that 25-0 run.

The Mercy Rule shortened the fourth quarter preventing an even wider margin of victory.

Other Lady Indians adding to the scoring include freshman Eryn Cochran with 7 points, senior Crystal Bishop with 4 points, freshman Makayla Underwood with 4 points and sophomore Davilyn Blythe with 3 points.

In boys' action, seniors Bradley Swanson, D.J. Rogers, Brett Bradshaw and Corbin Gilfilian combined for 53 points en route to a 62-29 victory over the Andrews Wildcats.

Swanson led the way for the Indians with 20 points, followed by Rogers

## Kendall to approve county's \$9.38 million Fiscal Budget

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Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall is poised to approve a proposed a \$9.38 million county budget for Fiscal 2011 on Thursday.

A hearing is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday at the Towns County Courthouse to adopt the 2011 Towns County Fiscal Budget. The current Fiscal Budget is \$9.42 million.

Commissioner Kendall said that the proposed budget doesn't include reoccurring expenses such as salary increases. However, it does assure all Towns County employees will have a job in 2011. He reiterated that the county's hiring freeze will continue in certain areas that haven't previously lost employees through attrition.

Commissioner Kendall has planned a conservative budget with projected revenues down \$344,061 due to an increase in the local homestead exemption passed by local voters in 2009. It also accounts for a decrease in the county's millage rate from 5.580 mills to 5.570 mills.

The Commissioner's proposed budget restores \$23,000 the Library lost due to cuts by the Board of Education and up to \$5,000 in

matching funds that the Friends of the Library may raise for books cut by the state government.

It also restores \$25,000 for the local health department that the state government will cut in the next state budget.

Commissioner Kendall said that he felt the budget was a good one considering the nation remains in the worst recession since the Great Depression of the 1930s.

"This is a reaffirmation that I will not raise your taxes at a time when electrical rates and food prices continue to rise," he said. "Wages are stale or non-existent in many cases due to the high unemployment rate."

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Tickets are still available for Saturday's Loretta Lynn Concert at Anderson Music Hall, Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds General Manager Hilda Thomason said.

The Queen of Country Music, celebrated last week at the Country Music Awards for 50 years in the Country Music industry, will appear at Anderson Music Hall at 7 p.m. on Saturday, Thomason said.

Seats for the Loretta Lynn performance are \$40, plus \$2 handling for Level I seating; prices for Level II

Loretta Lynn, whose musical career began with I'm a Honky Tonk Girl, in 1960, has written more than 160 songs and released 70 albums. She has had 10 No. 1 albums and 16 No. 1 singles on the Country Mu-

sic charts. She has won numerous awards including four Grammy Awards, seven American Music Awards, eight Broadcast Music Incorporated Awards and 10 Academy of Country Music Awards.

Loretta Lynn has never been shy. In her heyday, she kept Country Music on the front page for her views on how women are treated, their civil rights and why women should stand up and be counted among the masses.

Sissy Spacek won the Oscar for Best Actress for her portrayal of Loretta

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
