Kendall to approve county's \$9.38 million Fiscal Budget

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall is poised to approve a proposed a \$9.38 million county budget for Fiscal 2011 on Thursday.

A hearing is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday at the Towns County Courthouse to adopt the 2011 Towns County Fiscal Budget. The current Fiscal Budget is \$9.42 million.

Kendall said that the proposed budget doesn't include reoccurring expenses such as salary increases. However, it does assure all Towns County employees will have a job through attrition. Commissioner Kendall
