The Lighting of the Christmas Tree which is presented by the Enota Garden Club will be at Mayor's Park in Young Harris at 6 p.m. on




Sproule Home

Sproule Home

This is a perfect example of an addition and remodeling project that transformed one of the original lakefront homes of the 1980's into a 21st century showplace. Bob and Ann Sproule contracted with

home plan designer Judi Smith and builder/remodeler Hallam Construction Services, Inc. to convert a modest older lakefront home to a larger more modern structure. The back wall of the upper floor of the house was removed to extend the living space and add screen porches. A breezeway was added to attach the original house to a new two car garage with bonus room and full bath. The breezeway houses a laundry and two storage closets. The gourmet kitchen features

Italian marble countertops.

The master suite was redesigned with the addition of an office. Lots of trapezoid windows and woodwork with custom stains are features not to be missed. The remainder of the original home was upgraded to completely match the new construction. Christmas decorating by Carol Lumpkin.

The original cottage is contained inside the new construction, with updates, of course. The finished home is five bedrooms, four baths and two garages on three levels. The D-log faced home is finished with local creek rock in the "lodge" style.
