

Patton signs with Skyhawks

Lady Indians' senior will continue playing days with Point University

The first of the Towns County Lady Indians' seniors has signed to play college basketball.

Lindsay Patton, who overcame a torn ACL her junior year, has signed to play at the next level with Point University, Lady Indians' Head Coach Jim Melton said on Monday.

Point University, formerly Atlanta Christian College, is a member of the Appalachian Athletic Conference division of the NAIA. Point University will relocate their campus in the fall of 2012 from East Point to West Point. Point will renovate a gym in downtown West Point where the Lady Skyhawks will play their home games. The off-campus apartments will be located in Lanett, Ala. and the academic classes will be held in downtown West Point.

Tickets go on sale Friday morning at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds for the Feb. 11, 2012 Willie Nelson Concert.

Ticket prices are \$45 plus \$2 handling for the concert scheduled for 7 p.m. on Feb. 11th, 2012 at Anderson Music Hall.

On Halloween 2009, Nelson rocked a packed Anderson Music Hall at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds and sent the capacity crowd home smiling with autographs in hand.

Tickets for the 2009 concert sold out in six days. A similar affection for these tickets is expected, Fairgrounds General Manager Hilda Thomason said.

"I don't know many people who don't enjoy Willie Nelson," she said. "He's a Country Music icon, right up there with Johnny

Cash, Waylon Jennings, Merle Haggard and George Jones."

At the 2009 concert at Anderson Music Hall, Willie's fans ignored the rain clouds looming overhead and flocked to see the legendary singer/songwriter perform such hits as *On the Road Again*, *Georgia*, and *Blue Eyes Cryin' In The Rain*.

Willie took the stage at The Hall around 7:20 p.m. that night and ended his

Beloved Dick Paris dies at 97

A community icon has passed away.

Dick Paris was born in Paulding County, but make no mistake about it, he was Towns County through and through.

H.D. "Dick" Paris, 97, died Tuesday, Nov. 22 at his home. Mr. Paris loved sports, especially, the Georgia Bulldogs' football team. At the time of his passing, Mr. Paris was the oldest living alumni of the University of Georgia in Athens.

Mr. Paris was a cornerstone of the Towns County community. A year after having served three years in the European Theater of World War II, Mr. Paris moved to Hiawassee and started a business that still lasts today, Hiawassee Hardware Company.

Mr. Paris rolled up his sleeves once he arrived here in Hiawassee in 1947.

A tireless worker, Mr. Paris focused his efforts on Hiawassee Hardware, the Bank of Hiawassee, and later the Georgia Mountain Fair.

"Dick Paris was a part of the cornerstones of growth for Hiawassee and Towns County for decades," Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall said.

Born Aug. 7, 1914, the next to the youngest of six children, Mr. Paris grew up on a farm which produced vegetables and produce for truck farming. He attended Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College in Tifton, and later the University of Geor-

gia in Athens. He graduated from the latter in 1941 with a degree in agriculture economics.

Upon his arrival in

Hiawassee, Mr. Paris became a vivid, energetic and integral force in the community.

with a fifth place spot in one of the toughest wrestling challenges in the state. Last season, the Indians finished seventh, winning two silvers and two fourth-place finishes. The team went to North Hall, followed by Lumpkin and Dawson counties respectively.

Tim Collier and Josh Barnes took home the silver medals for the Indians in 2010.
