New development comes to Towns

As many as 45 new jobs are headed to Towns County as the Baptist Retirement Communities of Georgia looks to add its third campus.

The project, estimated between \$8 million and \$10 million, is slated to be built on almost 23 acres beside Towns County Schools, President and CEO Laura Willis said last week at Hiawassee City Hall.

Willis said the facility will employ between 40 and 45 people, not to mention the countless construction jobs that will accompany the project.

"I'm excited," Hiawassee Mayor Barbara Mathis said. "It is so wonderful to know that we're getting something in our area that will provide jobs for local people and will boost the economy in our

"I think it's fabulous to have the Georgia Baptist Association here, I really do," Mayor Mathis said.

"I think this is just the beginning," he said. "Businesses and organizations are starting to realize that we have such a low tax base. That in and of itself is a legitimate calling card for commercial and residential growth."

Baptist Retirement Communities of Georgia, Inc. is an agency of the Georgia Baptist Convention. It operates under a charter granted by the state as a non-profit organization for ministry to senior citizens.

Willis said that the group had been looking at locations in the North Georgia Mountains for almost four years before finally set-
