ABC News honors Towns' Pearl Vet

Henry Hedden named one of 11 heroes of 2011

Towns County's last Pearl Harbor veteran has been honored as one of ABC News' 11 Heroes of 2011.

Henry Hedden, who died two days before the 70th anniversary of the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor, was selected among thousands of heroes from across the nation by ABC News last week.

His name was submitted by his granddaughter Emmalyn Dyer, who told the network that "Henry Hedden was her true life hero." She submitted her grandfather's name and a photograph on the network's Facebook page.

Henry Hedden graduated from Towns County High School in 1940 and

along with his friend George Denton, joined the United States Army. He was one of seven Towns County men who enlisted in the United States Army that year and were present during one of the most violent days in our nation's history.

Kendall creates Consumer Protection Division

The recent increase in bank foreclosures and sales, not only of homes and lots, but entire subdivisions, have convinced Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall that local residents need consumer protection.

Commissioner Kendall has created the Commissioner's Office of Consumer Protection to protect local residents from purchasing property that eventually could cost them thousands above the purchase price.

"This service to Towns County citizens is being set up without additional cost to the taxpayers," Commissioner Kendall said. "It will be staffed by the present office personnel and with the same phone system now in place. One of the phone lines in the Commissioner's office, (706) 896-2277 will be converted exclusively for the Commissioner's Office of Consumer Protection."

One of the many problems locals are experiencing is knowing what county services are available at the time they purchase their home or lot.

Commissioner Kendall said that too many times residents are investing considerable sums of money to

purchase real estate or homes without first investigating what services the county provides to the property.

Some of those questions that will be answered by the Consumer Protection Division will be whether the road in question is county maintained, or is it the homeowner's responsibility.

Property owners also need to know if there is a deeded or prescriptive county right-of-way; if so, how wide? What different property rights do I have with a prescriptive right-of-way?

Property owners also
