As 2009 winds down, 2010 is ready to come to fruition. That being said, we must remember that 2010 also is a year to count heads in each community throughout the nation.

The 2010 Census is upon us and the U.S. Census Bureau is concerned that Towns County's homeless will go uncounted.

Needless to say, it is important that these residents be counted, as they draw upon county resources. According to U.S. Census Bureau statistics, there were nearly 50 homeless residents in Towns County in 2008-2009. The Bureau needs your help in locating these people.

It's important for everyone to stand up and be counted, even the homeless. Accurate head counts equal federal dollars that provide government assistance to people who are struggling to make ends meet. The real question is will there be a way to accurately count the homeless residents in Towns County.

Do you know of any

locations where the homeless gather or stay on a regular basis? If so, the U.S. Census Bureau needs your help. Juanita Crake, the partnership assistant for the Bureau is in charge of making sure all heads are counted. She asks that if anyone knows of the locations, including as close to a formal address as possible, and an estimate of the number of people who gather at each location.

With these figures, Crake will make sure that adequate federal dollars come to Towns County in means of government assistance.

She's also trying to determine where food ministry vans stop to deliver food to homeless residents. If there's anyone who can provide information on the location, days and times, and the number of people involved, those details will be most helpful. It also helps to have the information regarding the sponsor of each mobile food van.

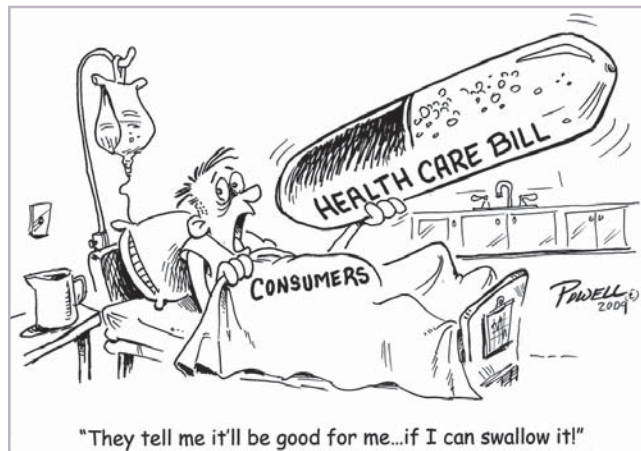
