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Indians, Lady Indians go undefeated for second straight week

Towns County High School Basketball gave stellar performances last week, with the Indians and Lady Indians going undefeated for a second week in a row to boost the region records of both teams.

The boys and girls wore bright pink uniforms in support of Cancer Awareness for the month of January.

On Tuesday, Jan. 17, Towns hosted Greene County, resulting in a 68-46 victory for the girls and a 66-54 win for the boys.

The top performers for the Lady Indians were senior Sarah Shook with 14 points, 3 rebounds and 3 assists; junior Brelan Sieveking, 17 points, 8 assists and 3 rebounds; sophomore Kaleigh Beaver with a double-double, 18 points, 10 rebounds and 4 steals; senior Tabitha Barnes, 7 points; junior Emma Lallement, 5 points and 4 rebounds; and junior Laura Mauldin with 2 charges, 8 rebounds, 3 steals and 3 assists.

"It was a great team win, and we are continuing to get better every week," Towns County Lady Indians Head Coach Shea Taylor said. "We still have a ways to go, but I am very proud of this team and their hard work.'

Top performers for the boys against Greene County were senior Lane Rouse with 17 points including five 3-pointers; junior Zane Floyd, 15 points; and junior Connor Chastain, 14 points.

"Towns County led for the entirety of the game, save for a few seconds in the first half," Towns County Indians Head Coach Brian Hunnicutt said. "We held a 12-point halftime lead and stretched it to as much as 20 in the
