Iwo Jima veteran Bud Johnson spotlights upcoming anniversary

YOUNG HARRIS -Veterans of Towns County will be hosting a ceremony on Monday, Feb. 20, at the

Towns County Recreation and Conference Center to commemorate the 72nd anniversary of the beginning of the Battle of Iwo Jima, on Feb. 19, 1945.

"Seventy-two years ago, we landed on Iwo Jima, an island in the Pacific," said Bud Johnson, retired U.S. Navy Chief Petty Officer and beloved Towns County resident. "Monday, the 20th of February, at 2 p.m. at our conference center by the Iwo Jima statue memorial, we'll be holding a ceremony in remembrance of our fallen soldiers and of all those who fought."

The Battle of Iwo Jima would prove to be one of the most calamitous battles in American history. From Feb. 19, 1945, to March 26, 1945, American forces suffered more than 26,000 casualties on the island, and nearly 7,000 soldiers lost their lives in the service of liberty and freedom for everyone back in the states and around the world.

During the battle alone, more than 6,000 American soldiers lost their lives, and more than 19,000 were wounded, proving to be a battle that no

City Council votes to redraft overlay district in Young Harris

YOUNG HARRIS -Plans to rework the overlay district for a Young Harris College construction project have been of the utmost

priority for the Young Harris City Council during the last six months.

During the council's monthly meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 7, the council took a step forward in the process to rework the ordinance variance regarding building height restrictions within the overlay district.

A few months ago, the city attempted to receive an exemption from the county that would pertain to a new structure aimed toward expanding YHC housing facilities for oncampus students. Former Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall refused the request, explaining that such an exemption could have a ripple effect on the future topography of the county with an influx of See Young Harris, Page 6A


