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After 21 years, Mayor Mathis says she'll be retiring soon

Earlier this week, Hiawassee Mayor Barbara Mathis said that she would be retiring before the end of her

term this year. She addressed her retirement amid the swirling of local rumors.

"There's too many rumors out here," said Mayor Mathis when reached for comment over the weekend. "People are saying that I've retired, that I am retiring, that I'm going to retire by (March) 21st – I haven't set a date yet. I have no date yet."

Added Mayor Mathis: "When I decide to retire, I will be announcing it. I am going to retire, but I have not set a date yet."

And though she has yet to set a date, the mayor did say that she would be retiring sometime in the next two

On Monday, the mayor signed a document authorizing Hiawassee City Councilwoman and Mayor Pro Tem Liz Ordiales to:

"Negotiate contracts with third parties for the provision of services to the City of Hiawassee, including but not limited to, code enforcement, building inspections, website and social media services, landscaping and lawn maintenance services, cleaning services, trash pickup services, demand services for the maintenance and repair

of the city's water and sewer systems, and any other third party with which the city desires to do business.

Georgia voters could soon experience a blast from the past as members of the Georgia House of Representatives weigh Senate Resolution 192, introduced by District 50 State Sen. John Wilkinson.

The resolution proposes an amendment to the Constitution so as to authorize the General Assembly to provide by law for election of local school superintendents by voters and election of members of local boards of education by grand juries, as an alternative to appointment of local school superintendents
