Towns County Youth Football League signups begin this weekend

Calling all football fans – Towns County Youth Football League signups begin Saturday, June 24, between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. at the old Towns County Rec Building.

Interested young athletes new to the league and their parents should bring a copy of the child's birth certificate at signup, as it will be provided to the Smoky Mountain Conference as proof of age.

Kids who played last year will not need to provide copies of their birth certificates at signup. For all players, a one-time payment of \$90 will be required at the time of signup in order to cover costs of playing during the season, including insurance, a game jersey that kids will get to keep at the end of the season, and a trophy at the end-of-year banquet.

Athletes can also sign up on the following Saturdays: July 8, July 15, July 22 and July 29 at the old rec center between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

Team practices begin on July 31, and Aug. 12 will be the



cutoff date to sign up for one of the teams.

Towns County Youth Cheerleading will be signing up participants alongside football players on Saturday, June 24,

and Saturday, July 8.

Again, in order to be accepted on one of the teams, parents of new players will need to provide a copy of their child's birth certificate at the time of

signup, along with the \$90.

Teams are broken down into categories according to age: Pee Wees are 5 and 6-year-olds; Termites are 7 and 8-year-olds; Mites are 9 and 10-year-

olds; and Midgets are 11 and 12-year-olds.

This year will be Youth Football Director Jimmy Smith's 21st and final year directing the Towns County

program, as well as the county's fourth year in the Smoky Mountain Conference.

"I've had a ball doing this," said Director Smith. "There just comes a time when it's time to go. I've enjoyed every minute being with the kids. I'm sure I'm going to miss it."

"I've had great kids over the years, with great support from parents and the community. It became part of my life and I'll never forget it, but it's just about time to move on and let somebody else take over."

After this season, the Towns County Rec Department will be heading up the youth football program, and Director Smith said he feels good about Towns County Recreation Director Matt Youngblood leading the youth football charge in 2018.

2017 Towns County Youth Football kicks off its regular season on Saturday, Aug. 19, in a home game against the Cherokee Braves out of North Carolina, to be played at the Towns County Recreation and Conference Center at Foster Park.

All youth games begin at 9:30 a.m., starting with the Pee Wees.
