Basketball: Lady Indians split with Commerce at TCHS summer camp

The Towns County Lady Indians and new head coach Alan Rogers hosted Chestatee, Commerce, Elbert County and Union County during a Thursday, June 25 basketball camp. However, due to last minute cancelations, the Lady Indians and Commerce closed out the camp with consecutive contests, allowing each squad a pair of games.

The first meeting saw Commerce pull away in a 49-41 victory, before Towns answered back with a 15-point win in game two.

Towns County is paced by a pair of returning starters in senior Kaleigh Beaver and junior Scotlyn Fain. Despite the graduation of starters Emma Lallement, Laura Mauldin and Breelan Sieveking, the Lady Indians feature a talented group of underclassmen, headlined by a deep crop of rising sophomores.

As for the GHSA's recent reclassification, Region 8-A (D2) and Towns County won't see much of a change to their schedule this winter. Aquinas and Georgia School for Innovation are headed out the door while Greene County, LOA, Lincoln County, Taliaferro County, Warren County and Washington Wilkes remain.

As for non-region play, Towns County will play two games vs. Union County, as well as the Battle of the States Christmas Tournament, among other opponents.
