training them on how to drop the bombs.

“During his time in the Army, Frontz also served as a pitcher for the Army baseball team. Frontz is entitled to wear the World War II Victory Ribbon and the American Campaign Ribbon.”

After presenting Goring with his quilt, Young followed with a brief history of Sonnenfeld’s service.

“After enlisting in active service on June 1, 1943, Shirley enlisted with the Navy WAVES as a stenographer,” said Young. “She performed her U.S. Navy training in Bronx, New York, and Cedar Falls, Iowa. She was later stationed at the Bureau of Naval Personnel in Washington, D.C.”

“Shirley stated that Washington was a battlefield

Atlanta Rhythm Section, Molly Hatchet to play The Hall

Georgia’s own Atlanta Rhythm Section is set to rock Anderson Music Hall with Molly Hatchet on Saturday, July 14.

Doors open at 7 p.m. that Saturday, and fans will want to get their hands on tickets now at GeorgiaMountainFairgrounds.com while supplies last.

“The fans will get their

money’s worth,” said Rodney Justo, frontman for Atlanta Rhythm Section. “They’re going to see us play the hits, plus some deep cuts.”

“We’ve reached the point after almost 50 years together where we can modify our shows. We don’t do the same show every night. Most bands do the same show every night, it doesn’t matter where they are. We can modify our shows.”

Atlanta Rhythm Section,

or ARS, and its members have enjoyed a storied career dating all the way back to 1971.

Since then, the band has put out 15 original records and released a number of smash hits, including “Spooky,” “Champagne Jam,” “So Into You,” “Imaginary Lover” and “Homesick,” to name a few.

And even after all this time, Justo and his bandmates still get a kick out of interacting with the people who love their music.

“My favorite part of the gig is after the gig, when we sit around and sign T-shirts and CDs,” said Justo. “We get to talk to friends of the band, and that’s my favorite thing to do.”

“I love traveling, I love meeting people, I love joking around with people, and I love keeping the legacy of the band alive.”

It’s been over five years since ARS played at The Hall, and fans of the band, both newcomers and longtime listeners alike, will not want to miss this show.

“Show up, you won’t be disappointed,” said Justo. “I don’t care how old you are or how young you are. By the time you’re done, you’ll say, ‘Wow, that was a fun show.’”

Also playing that evening will be Molly Hatchet, another Southern Rock band that formed in 1971.

Molly Hatchet is best known for their song “Flirtin’ with Disaster,” and the band has experienced much commercial success over the years.

“In the early 1970s, a new form of music was emerging in the South,” according to MollyHatchet.com. “A mixture of blues, country, gospel and the English invasion of rock and roll that later was to be coined the phrase ‘Southern Rock.’

“The music was filled with style and emotion ... with bands in the forefront such as the Allman Brothers, Lynyrd Skynyrd, and a band from Jacksonville, Florida, called Molly Hatchet.”

Also this week is the 10th Annual Georgia Mountain Moonshine Cruiz-In, which runs Thursday, July 12, through Saturday, July 14.

During the Cruiz-In at the fairgrounds, folks can expect to see plenty of classic cars, hotrods, trucks, bikes, rat rods and more.

The Hiwassee Town Square will be hosting a block party leading up to the Cruiz-In on Wednesday, July 11. The city will show the movie “Grease” that evening, and it will be billed as a drive-in movie.

And starting next weekend, the 68th Annual Georgia Mountain Fair will be taking over the fairgrounds.

Beginning July 20, the Fair will bring nine days of pure entertainment to the county. From music to games, crafts and a human cannonball act, this year’s Fair promises tons of excitement for everyone who attends.

is cause for alarm because nobody has heard anything since the night of July 3. No texts, no messages, no letters, no forewarning, nothing – they just up and left.”

The two were last seen in a gray 1992 Toyota pickup with a Georgia license plate reading RLR9341.

According to the latest information on the “Union County -Georgia Sheriff’s Office” Facebook page, the

teens were spotted on Saturday, July 7, in Bryson City, North Carolina, at the Country Girls RV Park.

The pair left the RV park at dark, traveling in an unknown direction, and they are reportedly doing side jobs for money.

So far, the sheriff’s office has notified fellow law enforcement agencies all over the region, and they are asking anyone with info to please come forward.
