



GBI announces promotion of Dustin Hamby to Assistant Special Agent in Charge

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation announces the promotion of Dustin Hamby to Assistant Special Agent in Charge of the Appalachian Regional Drug Enforcement Office (ARDEO) in Cleveland, GA. ASAC Hamby will be responsible for the supervision of the Special Agents and Task Force Agents assigned to this work unit. ARDEO conducts high level drug investigations in the North Georgia area.

ASAC Hamby has been employed with the GBI for over 18 years. He began his GBI career as a Narcotics Agent at the Oconee Drug Task Force (ODTF) and the Macon Regional Drug Office. In 2005, ASAC Hamby was assigned as a Special Agent to the Region 1 Office in Calhoun, GA. ASAC Hamby transferred to the Region 8 Office in Cleveland, Georgia in 2006, where he was appointed as a Child Abuse Specialist, and served there until his promotion to ASAC. ASAC Hamby has also served as a Certified Law

Enforcement Instructor for several years and has been one of the GBI agents responsible for teaching death investigations and interviews and interrogations to new GBI agents during that time.

ASAC Hamby began his law enforcement career in 2000 with the ODTF in Cochran, GA as a Task Force Agent. ASAC Hamby served at the ODTF until 2002, when he accepted a position as a Narcotics Agent with the GBI. During ASAC Hamby's time with the ODTF, he worked drug investigations in the Oconee Judicial Circuit.

ASAC Hamby received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice from the University of North Georgia in August of 2000.

get classes clean throughout the day."

"All teachers are going to have cleaning solutions in their classrooms so they can clean desks and things between classes," Berrong added. "We're doing everything we know that we can do to try to keep the place as safe as humanly possible."

A list of the various virus precautions the schools are taking is available at towns.k12.ga.us, to include daily staff and student temperature checks to screen for COVID-19, and classes will be partaking in "no assemblies, no field trips" for the time being.

As with every corner of society, the school system is dealing with the inevitability of positive coronavirus cases, and Berrong said the schools will continue to do so while keeping people as safe as possible throughout the school year.

"It's not a matter of if someone in the system gets it while in school, it's just when," Berrong said. "What we have to do is try to work with the Department of Public Health and try to figure out who gets quarantined and who does not."

"Our original plan was, if so many individuals got the virus, we'd shut the whole

school down. But the way we've now scheduled things, our hope is that, if someone, say, in the seventh grade gets the virus, we can simply quarantine the seventh grade and everybody else can continue to go to school."

Sadly, two Georgia children under the age of 18 had passed away from COVID-19 by press time: one 17-year-old young man with underlying health conditions earlier this year, and a 7-year-old boy with no known health problems last week. But nearly without exception, children survive infections.

"It's a very small percentage of kids 1-18 who, No. 1, even contract the virus, and No. 2, the sickness rate and the death rate are very small," Berrong said. "The concern for kids is them taking it home to their parents and grandparents."

Of course, there are many unknowns about the year ahead, and Superintendent Berrong and his staff will be working hard to educate the children of the county while protecting them, too.

"The goal is safety and trying to keep kids safe, and we also have to keep our main focus as trying to educate these students," Berrong said.

"There's a virus here, but students are still going to be graduating - they've still got to go get jobs, they've got to go to college."

"So, the No. 1 focus is trying to educate kids and manage online and traditional learning, and trying to make sure that our online kids are getting the same quality education we're providing in the classroom."

"And we're going to be cleaning and trying to keep kids as safe as possible (on campus) because, the truth is, if we have a big outbreak then we can't be in the building. And that's the No. 1 thing, we want kids in our school learning from our teachers."

Berrong said he would like parents to know that he and the rest of the school faculty and staff would be doing "everything in our power to make sure that their students are safe within our walls."

"And we're going to do everything in our power to make sure our teachers are safe within our walls, too," Berrong said. "The main thing we want is to get through this school year and have kids in our school building. And no matter what we have to do, we're going to try to do that."
