Chatsworth - Towns County is 1-0 for the first time since 2021 following a 42-14 season-opening victory at Murray County.

The Indians were all geared up and ready to go when the scheduled game at Chatsworth was called for extreme weather.

The game was postponed until Saturday, August 17th at noon and it was a scorcher. The thermometer topped out at 91 degrees. But that didn't hinder the Indians. Our tribe bested their tribe (Murray County Indians) 42 -14.

Towns County grabbed a 14-0 lead after one and doubled the lead entering the break. The Indians held a 35-0 advantage through three.

"I was very excited by how well the team showed us what we see in practice every day," head coach Jason Roquemore said. "We tell the guys to go out there and do your job to the best of your ability and that's what we saw. Tremendous effort. Watching the film, even the mistakes we made were made with effort."

Quarterback Peyton Mc-Gaha completed 13 of 14 passes for 154 yards and two touchdowns for a 152.8 rating.
