| Hiawassee man dies in two-car crash in Hall Co.

WAUKA MOUNTAIN - A Hiawassee man died and his wife was seriously injured in a two-car head-on crash last week in Hall County.

Samuel Dwayne Osborn, 61, brother of Union County Sheriff's Lt. Daren Osborn, died when the 2009 Ford Escape he was driving was struck head on by a 2002 Mitsubishi Gallant driven by William Simmemon, 56, of Alto, according to the Georgia State Patrol.

Simmemon also died as a result of injuries sustained in the crash. Dwayne Osborn's passenger, his wife, Vivian Osborn, 54, of Hiawassee, was injured and transported to Northeast Georgia Medical Center, according to GSP.

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County honors history of Swanson Mountain

YOUNG HARRIS-The official title of "Young Harris "Swanson Mountain," and on Saturday, Aug. 27, the Towns County Historical Society with Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall unveiled a namesake sign at the intersection of Georgia 515 West and Fox Run Road.

The sign will serve as a reminder to residents and passersby of the mountain's

"Erecting the sign is not naming the mountain, just recognizing (Swanson Mountain as its name)," Jerry Taylor said. "Locally, most people refer to it as 'Young Harris Mountain, but that has never been its proper name. It was named 'Swanson Mountain' long ago, and was on the U.S. Department of Interior quadrangle maps as

At 2,323 feet above sea level, the mountain was once known as Land Lot 48, 17th District, 1st Section of original Union County, now Towns

In 1832, the Cherokee Nation was divided into lots and given away in a land lottery. Land Lot 48 was drawn by Drury Cox of Monroe County.

In preparation for removing the Cherokee, who were still living on the land, an evaluation of the property

Preventing bites key to avoiding Zika

Zika has made its way to each of the 50 United States through travel-related cases, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, though only Florida to date has seen local transmission of the virus via mosquitoes.

There is concern, however, that the virus could spread even in areas that don't have locally infected mosquitoes, through sex with an infected partner.

And as of Friday, Georgia has four weeks to comply with a Food and Drug

Of the many public interests voiced during the meeting, the primary issue revolved around the economic development and beautification of the city. Many residents present expressed their desire for restaurants and businesses




