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Indians defeat Eagles in 13-6 double overtime victory

The Towns County Indians knew they were in trouble when Riverside Military Academy scored a touchdown to tie the game at 6-6 with only 30 seconds left in the fourth quarter.

They were in trouble because, at 6-6, all the Eagles needed to do was kick a good point after to take the lead, leaving the Indians a mere 30 seconds to retaliate before game's end.

The Eagles kicker approached the ball, kicked it wide, and in a flash, the Boys in Blue had their chance.

As the game clock ran out with the score still tied, the Indians opted to defend first during the initial overtime period.

In high school football, the way an overtime period works is, each team gets a chance to score before trading places at the 15-yard line and defending against the other team. The two teams trade places until one team scores and the other is unable to answer, thus ending the game.

Thanks to Towns County's nearly shut-out defense that played hard the whole game, Riverside Military came up short during their first possession. Unfortunately, so did the Indians.

But all that changed when they switched order of possession during the second overtime period, as Kobe Denton took the ball down to the 1-yard line in the first play of the drive, where Russell Cox was able to punch it in for a touchdown.

Major Moss made the Eagles prospects decidedly worse when he kicked a good point after, and when the blue defense once again shut down Riverside Military Academy after the Eagles got all the way down to the 2-yard line, the sweet smell of victory arose into the air.
