MURPHY, NC - Good news, Towns Countians - Lake Chatuge is clean, according to the Hiwassee River Watershed Coalition.

The coalition discussed water quality in its four-county area during the fourth annual State of the Water Address and Annual Meeting at Tri-County Community College in Murphy, North Carolina, on Tuesday, Oct. 24.

HRWC Executive Director Callie Moore said that the lake is good to go for all recreational purposes, including swimming and fishing.

"Generally, water quality in Towns County is good," said

It's finally that time of year, when the mountain air turns colder and the need for indoor heating becomes a must

Fortunately, Towns County Fire Chief Harold Copeland has a few suggestions on how to keep safe from fire, both in general and during these upcoming

winter months. "The No. 1 cause of fires in structures is kitchen fires, with cooking," said Chief Copeland. "In the event of a kitchen fire, you've got to just cut your stove off, remove the heat source from the grease.

'You can smother it with

another major source of housefires, like dyers with unclean vents that accumulate flammable buildup.

"The other common fire hazard is electrical malfunctions, which can be caused from the age of the home," said Chief Copeland. "We've had fires lately due to overloaded sockets and power strips, covering extension cords with rugs.

Heating the interiors of homes can be a challenge, especially for homes that don't have the most modern heating systems

Regardless of the nature of the source of heat, be it conventional or traditional, the chief says that both gas and electrical furnaces need to be
