CARROLLTON -- The youthful Towns County Lady Indians Cross Country team have built a solid foundation for the future following Saturday's top 10 finish at the Class A Public State Cross Country Champion-

"These girls are all freshman and they all act like freshman," Towns County Cross Country coach Tim Rosser said with a laugh before quickly turning serious prior to last weekend's race. "Nobody expected us to be here, but here we are, and we're going to give it our best shot."


When the dust settled, 101 runners had crossed the finish line and the Lady Indians found themselves among the top 10 in Class A Public Girls -- the final race of a two-day State Championship event that featured all seven classifications.

With 242 points, Towns County edged longtime arearival Commerce by 16 points, knocking the Tigers from the top 10. The Lady Indians finished just three points shy of ninth place Pelham County and 46 back of another area-foe, 8th place Georgia Military College.


Individally, Towns was led by 24th place Bazya Smith at 25:46. In 33rd was Alison Markham at 26:26, Kayla Peacock was 54th at 28:33, Macy Brinson was 72nd at 30:04 and Gali Quijada placed 80th at 31:24.

"I'm proud of what our girls accomplished," Rosser added. "We placed fourth at Area, just barely missing third, and that's more than a lot of people expected. But these girls always give their best and continue to get better with each race.'
