Added Henderson, "It is the time of the year where everyone is supposed to be jolly, and we want to allow the community to enjoy it, and I am 100% on board with it."

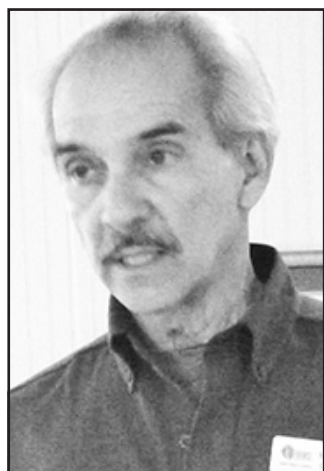
Community involvement is important to Henderson, as he believes the Sheriff's Office and community should work hand in hand to arrive at a place of mutual respect and understanding.

Garden Club welcomes Firewise's Michael Courey

At the November 19, 2020 Garden Club meeting, members welcomed Michael Courey, President of the Towns County Firewise Citizen's Coalition, part of Firewise USA. He passed out many pamphlets with important information concerning wildfires in our mountain area. This group was started in Georgia 20 years ago because, believe it or not, Georgia has more fires than California and other states in the west.



Mr. Courey demonstrated something new at Firewise, a sprinkler that can be attached to your gutters and using a garden hose, wets down your roof in the event of a wildfire. Members of Firewise help communities realize what is needed to keep fires from destroying homes, especially in Towns County, which is 62% public land—Chattahoochee National Forest and TVA.

Wildfire travels fastest going up a mountain and we have a lot of mountain homes, most with wooden decks to enjoy the beautiful views. Fire-

wise has worked diligently to educate our residents by forming Firewise Communities—we have 24 in Towns County, the most in the State of Georgia. Firewise members help these communities take out dead trees and brush and put through a chipper; trees are trimmed from ground to walking height, and leaves are raked from around the house and under decks, propane tanks, etc.

These are all fuel for fire.

Call Courey at 813-486-3782 to get more information on making your community a Firewise Community and their program, Ready, Set, Go, which lays out a plan in case you do have a fire.

Shop Small this Saturday and make a big impact

The biggest reason for shopping locally is compelling - for every \$100 spent at a locally-owned business, \$73 remains in the local economy, and \$27 leaves. Compare that to the same \$100 spent at a non-locally owned business, where \$43 remains in the local economy and \$57 leaves. Recent research has shown that local restaurants return nearly 79 percent of revenues to the community, compared to just over 30 percent for chain restaurants. When profits stay local, it increases the community's wealth, tax revenue and quality of living.

Small businesses and local businesses are the backbone of our economy. In Georgia alone, 1,000,000 businesses are small businesses which make up 99.6% of all businesses in the State. In recent years, 41,287 new jobs were created because of small businesses, meaning that 43.7% working in the State of Georgia work for a small business.

Keep Money Local—Sales taxes fund our communities and provide vital services such as police and fire protection, street repairs and

trash collection

Local Investment—Local businesses are less susceptible to national downturns and more likely to work harder to stay open.

The majority of the money spent will remain in this community! Shop Small and make a Big Impact! T/Nov25.G2/SH

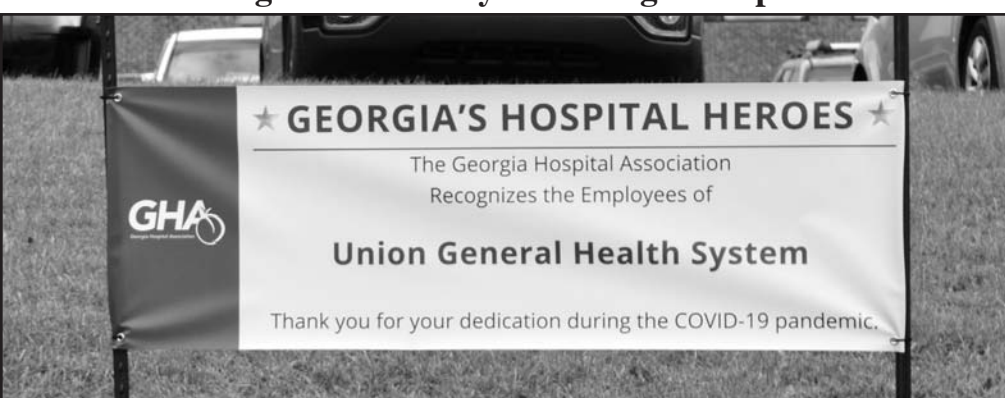
Humane Society's Mountain Shelter receives donation
