## Ailing Indians fall at Lumpkin; BOTS opens Wednesday

Dahlonega - In their only game of last week, the Class Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team faced not only a prominent Class AAA opponent in Lumpkin County and a trip across the mountain to Dahlonega but ill health as well with most members of the team feeling the effects of flu like symptoms.

Under the circumstances, it was quite a tribute that the Indians fought valiantly and remained in contention until the final minutes of the game before coming out on the short end of a 71-52 score with the game being much more competitive than the final score would indicate.

The Indians finished the 2016 portion of their regular season with a 7-3 record while the defending Battle of the States Champion Lumpkin County Indians improved to 6-6 with the win against a quite formidable schedule after losing much of their fire power from last year and opening the season with a 1-3 record including a loss to the Indians in Hiawassee.

The Tournament has be-

come a most respected sporting event, drawing interest from fans and teams over much of the Southeast, as evidenced by the fact that teams from six different states have made appearances during the first twenty two years the event has been held. There has been just one

change in the lineup of teams from last year's tournament as Swain County (North Carolina) of Bryson City is replacing White County (Georgia). Joining the Swain girls

and boys teams in the tournament will be the girls and boys teams from Hayesville (North Carolina), Hokes Bluff (Alabama), Lumpkin County (Georgia), Piedmont (Alabama), Polk County (Tennessee), Union County (Georgia), and of course host Towns County (Georgia). Polk County and Towns County are the only schools to particpate in every prior Battle of the States.

The Hokes Bluff Girls and Lumpkin County Boys are the defending Battle of the States champions with Hokes Bluff having defeated two time defending champion Hayesville 36-21 and Lumpkin defeating

defending champion Hayesville 46-43 in last year's championship games
