Tallulah Falls - In a week when three games were scheduled for each team, the Towns County Lady Indians and Indians Varsity basketball teams were limited to just one game each due to winter weather on Friday and Saturday with games at Commerce on Friday and Saturday's TCHS Homecoming games against Providence Christian of Lilburn being postponed.


