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Indians defeat Commerce and Tallulah for first wins, fall at Hayesville

After coming agonizingly short of victory on several occasions this season, the youthful Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team got their first win of the season in Commerce in a makeup game last Monday and celebrated the success by getting their second victory on Tuesday on senior night with Garrett Bradshaw appearing in his final home game for the Indians. The longer a team strives

for that first win, the more difficult it often becomes to pull off the feat but the Indians came through in fine style with numerous heroics both at Commerce and against Tallulah. The Indians would fall, however, largely due to decisive scoring runs of 9-2 and 10-0 in just the final 2:09 of the second quarter and the final 1:22 of the third, at Hayesville on Friday as the Yellow Jackets took a 60-38 victory.

The games against Commerce and Tallulah completed Region 8-A play for the Indians who vaulted above Tallulah into fourth place in Sub-Region 8-A North after the Tallulah Indians had defeated the Towns Indians 64-40 in November at Tallulah Falls. The week's work lifted the Indians to a 2-23 overall record with the Region 8-A Tournament scheduled for this week at Commerce High School in Commerce. 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Commerce - After trailing 2-0 on an early Commerce basket, the Indians tied the score on two free throws by Garrett Bradshaw and then took a 4-2 lead on two free throws by Dallas Manus and a 7-4 lead on a trey by Manus by the 5:15 mark of the first quarter. That lead would hold up for the Indians until the early stages of the fourth quarter when the Tigers overtook the Indians with a battle for the ages ensuing during the fourth quarter right up until the

But for first things first, a second trey by Manus and field goals by Trace Moss and Boone Moss had the Indians ahead 15-9 by the first quarter break and Bradshaw led five Indians entering the scoring column in the second quarter with five points as they built what would be their biggest lead of 27-12 on a Major Moss basket at the 1:42 mark. A late trey by the Tigers had them within 27-15 by intermission.

The Indians still led 37-26 on Manus' second field goal of the third quarter at the 2:22 mark but the Tigers closed out the quarter on a 7-0 run for just a 37-33 Indian lead entering the fourth quarter. When the Tigers then sank two free throws and a trey in less than half a minute at the start of the fourth quarter for a 38-37 lead, the aforementioned battle was on That trey would mark the first of six lead changes with five ties the remainder of the game.

A free throw by Major Moss would give the Indians a 38-

38 tie and a Boone Moss putback a 41-41 standoff before a Manus trev matched a trey by the Tigers for a 44-44 score at the 4:24 mark. The battle intensified, beginning at the 2:32 mark, when a Trace Moss free throw got the Indians ahead 45-44

Two free throws by Major Moss at 1:45 matched a Tiger field goal thirteen seconds earlier for a 47-46 Indian lead and back to back baskets by Boone Moss at 1:18 and fifty five seconds more than matched a Tiger trey for a 49-49 tie and then a 51-49 Towns lead. Commerce tied it again on

a field goal at thirty seven seconds but Major Moss found Bradshaw open for a field goal at twenty four seconds for a 53-51 Indian lead they would not relinquish. The assist by Major Moss was his fourth on the final four Indian baskets back to the 4:27 mark.

their next field goal attempt, Major Moss came up with the loose man Will de Vries forward to the and led by as much as 23-15 on ball and sank the first of two free throws at 12.0 seconds for his fourth in a row, forcing the Tigers to try and go for a 3-point basket

The Indians fouled the Tigers at 4.6 seconds with no chance for three points from the foul line but when the Tiger missed the free throw there was a held ball with the alternate possession going to

With 2.8 seconds on the clock, the Tigers got the ball inbounds for a 3-point attempt from the left corner but the shot missed the mark and Major Moss again corralled the carom off the rim with time expiring a second later and the Indians holding on for the very satisfying 54-51 victory. The tough victory brought memories to those who were in attendance of the Indians' late season game at Commerce two years ago when Manus, then a freshman, sank a long trey with the ball being in the air at the buzzer for a heart stopping 47-45 Indian victory.

The Indians were led in scoring for the game by Manus with 16 points, Boone Moss with 12, Bradshaw with 10, Trace Moss with 8, and Major Moss with 6. Major Moss contributed an astounding total of 9 assists for a freshman with six of them coming When the Tigers missed from the 3:06 mark of the third quarter on a pass to fellow freshend of the game with Trace Moss finishing second in assists with 2 according to your reporter's tally. Leading in rebounds were Boone Moss with 11, Major Moss with 7, Trace Moss with 6, and Bradshaw

game in just five nights due to the lead with 2:42 on the clock. rescheduled game on Monday at Commerce, the Indians could have been physically weary to the point of overriding their success of the night before.

They proved to be up to the task at hand as it turned out, however, as they would be able to build significant leads in the second quarter and then overcome the effect of similar leads by Tallulah in the third in pulling out the last ditch victory.

The Indians led by no more than 4-0 on two quick baskets by junior Boone Moss while Tallulah led by no more than 10-7 in the first quarter with the score being 10-9 at quarter's end after a late basket by freshman Adam Barrett which triggered a rapid start to the second for the Indians. They struck for the first eight points on a second field goal by Barrett and three by junior Trace Moss for a 17-10 lead by the 5:39 mark a Barrett basket with 2:30 on the

But Tallulah finished the quarter on an 8-2 run interrupted only by a basket by freshman Will de Vries for just a 25-23 Indian lead at intermission. And late second quarter success by Tallulah would continue in the third as they more than matched two field goals by senior Garrett Bradshaw by The Indians returned the

favor after that, however, on a 7-0 run for a 37-37 standoff which became a 39-37 Tallulah lead entering the fourth quarter on a basket at the buzzer. But the Indians weren't through as they brushed off the ultra brief Tallulah lead when de Vries took a Boone Moss pass and tied the score just four seconds into the fourth quarter and the Indians continued on for an overall 13-2 run and a 43-39 lead by the 4:01 mark.
