He was relieved by rested crew members who wet down the remaining hot spots until 4 p.m. Thursday evening.

"As the Information Officer for Towns County Fire & Rescue, I would advise anyone who finds themselves in a burning building, to get out of the building and stay out," Capt. Sellers said. "To return inside a burning building to retrieve a lost pet, valuables, or keepsakes is very dangerous.
"Inhaling the smallest

amount of smoke can cause choking, disorientation, and dizziness," Capt. Sellers said.







This happened under Tenth Amendment authority. Which of these sorts of actions is most likely to "fix" America? Is there a 'quick fix' for America? Only an informed electorate can say.
