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# **Towns County observes Memorial Day in Veterans Park**

Memorial Day is a day set aside to remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice to their country.

Thousands upon thousands have bravely laid down their lives in service to their country as members of the U.S. Armed Forces, and many gathered across the country on Monday, May 30, to commemorate those sacrifices.

Towns County paid its respects to such servicemen and women with its annual ceremony at Towns County Veterans Park.

The ceremony began with recognition of all veterans present, those who served during the Vietnam War, Korean War, World War II and active members of the military, as well as local officials and service members.

The keynote speaker was retired U.S. Army Col. Walt Shumway. Shumway served 32 years in the military - 28 years of active duty with the remainder of his time spent in the National Guard and Army Reserve.

During active duty, Shumway served three combat tours: 1965 in the Dominican Republic as an Airborne Company Commander; 1967 in Vietnam as a Company Commander; and 1972 to 1973 in Vietnam as an advisor to a South Vietnamese Army Battalion.

Shumway retired in 1989 and has lived in Hiawassee for 22 years.

"Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, fellow veterans, I am honored to be here today to speak to you on one of our great national holidays, which we remember and honor the service members who have made the supreme sacrifice for our country," said Shumway.

Shumway continued: "I want to share with you my thoughts of when I see our colors presented and hear our national anthem. I think about the freedom and the protection our country provides to all of

us, and I think about the origin of our national anthem.'

Shumway went on to share how the national anthem came about during the War of 1812, as Francis Scott Key, a young lawyer caught in the midst of the war, wrote a poem

after the fires had died down at Fort McHenry. That poem would later be the basis for the national anthem today, "The Star-Spangled Banner.'

"Today we face a new threat from the Middle East called ISIS," said Shumway.

"They have attacked Paris, France, and Belgium in recent months. They say they're coming to America.

"Only this time, our first line of defense is going to be different. It is going to be our

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#### TCMS scores earn school another award

Towns County Middle School received a notification from the Governor's Office of Student Achievement recently, alerting Principal Erica Chastain and Towns County Schools Superintendent Dr. Darren Berrong that their school had accomplished something special.

The middle school has earned the Greatest Gains School Award in Bronze for the 2015 school year, meaning that the middle school achieved a "three-year average of student growth in at least the 93rd percentile in the state," according to Gov. Nathan Deal's office.

"Receiving the award for Greatest Gains School is a wonderful honor for Towns County Middle School," said TCMS Principal Chastain. "It is a reflection of the hard work and effort from the teachers and students.'

Superintendent Berrong

couldn't agree more.

"As far as the middle school goes, it's actually very significant," said Dr. Berrong. "Before they changed from AYP (Adequate Yearly Progress) to now the new CCRPI (College and Career Ready Performance Index), Title I schools were given Title I distinguished school awards, and Towns County Middle School typically won those

every year. "Back in 2012 when CCRPI came around and took the place of AYP, they started naming schools as Title I Reward Schools, and they rewarded you in two different areas - one was in Greatest Gains and one was in Highest Achievement. That very first vear, the middle school actually made both lists.'

At the time, being recognized as both a Greatest Gains and a Highest Achievement school put TCMS in rare company – they were one of only two schools in the state to make both lists



that year.

"The following two years they were still on the Highest Achievement reward list, so this is the first year they've fallen off of the Highest Achievement, but they went back and got on the Highest Gains list," said Dr. Berrong. "So in four years of this being
