Once again Towns County Middle School was dominant in CRCT testing, leading their region in five test scores, including two perfect scores. One came in eighth grade reading, the second came in English

Also, in seventh grade reading, TCMS dominated again, with a score of 98.97 percent. In seventh grade English Language Arts, Towns County took top honors with a score of 98.97 percent. TCMS took top region honors in eighth grade Social Studies as well with a score of 96.55 percent.
