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TCMS King of the Mountain brings seven teams to the mat



ular season game for the Towns Indians after a scrimmage victory over Nantahala more than a week prior, Lumpkin had the advantage of this being their third regular season game as they improved their record to 3-0 with the victory. Lumpkin sprang out to a

10-0 lead before three baskets the final 4:01 of the first quarter by Adam Barrett helped keep Towns within 21-8 at quarter's end. Lumpkin extended the lead to 42-19 by intermission, however, with five Indians putting points on the scoreboard, including Barrett adding two more baskets for ten points in the first half.

Major Moss contributed seven points and Zach Davenport four in the third quarter but Lumpkin extended the lead further to 65-33 and finished the game with the 86-48 victory.

The fourth quarter would provide encouragement for the future for the Indians, however, as the younger members of the team played the final 4:40 of the game while facing a group of mostly more experienced substitutes for Lumpkin County.
