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Lady Indian JV's impress in season opening loss to White County

There were a lot of things to like in the Class A Towns County Lady Indian JV's opening game of the season last Tuesday as the ultra young team held their own for more than three quarters against the visiting Class AAAA White County Lady Warriors before falling by a 41-24 score. With no freshmen on the Lady Indians' roster this year and sophomores playing primary roles with the Lady Indian Varsity, they used the services of sophomores Makenzie Carroll, Kirsten Ledford, and Cadence Nichols and eighth graders Kristen Byers, Lexie Ledford, Lea Neumyer, Erica Spano, and Maddie Thomas in facing the Lady Warriors.

The first JV game usually poses quite a challenge for someone previously playing at the middle school and recreation levels but the challenge becomes even greater while still in middle school and facing all high school age players from a Class AAAA school who were well into their season.

The Lady Indians found themselves on the short end of the battle throughout the game but proved themselves persistent and successful in challenging their mostly older opponents in reducing deficits of as much as 10-2 in the first quarter, 15-5 in the second, and 24-16 in the third in making things uncomfortable for the Lady Warriors until a 13-0 finish gave White County a 41-24 for just a 26-22 deficit which


And then Thomas outscored the Lady Warriors 6-2 between the 2:58 and 46-second mark of the third quarter

came against the Woody Gap Falcons late in the evening Friday. Woody Gap scored first, a


