Indians fall to hot Lakeview start, use scoring runs of their own for win at GWA

In a weekend marked by decisive scoring runs, the Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team fell victim to a torrid first quarter run by the Lakeview Academy Lions which accounted for much of the final margin in a 71-44 Lions victory on Friday of last week in Gainesville.

On Saturday, however, two such runs by the Indians were more than enough to account for their margin of victory in a 56-35 decision over George Walton Academy in Monroe.

Those seeing both of last weekends' Indian games and not knowing the results of a game played between Lakeview and George Walton in Monroe on January 10, could reasonably expect that Lakeview is always as accurate in their field goal attempts as against the Indians, not only in the first quarter run but throughout the game, and that they might have defeated George Walton by something near the combined margin of 48 points in those two weekend games.

In actuality, however, Lakeview was forced to outscore the Bulldogs, who currently have a 2-20 overall record and 0-13 in Region 8A, by a 22-12 margin in the fourth quarter to escape with a 59-58 victory.

Lakeview completed the week with an overall record of 15-8, including 9-2 in the region and 5-1 for first place in Sub-Region 8-A North.

Both of last week's games were Region 8A contests for the Indians who completed the week with an overall record of 8-15, including 6-5 in the region and 4-2 in Sub-Region 8-A North.

Gainesville - Lakeview took leads of 7-0, 11-2, and 14-4 in building a 23-6 lead after one quarter on Friday in Gainesville with the Indians never able to make a comeback

as they have done with similar deficits in prior games but battling to a near standoff during the second and third quarters.

The Lions would outscore the Indians by just a 17-16 margin in the second quarter and 18-16 in the third for a 40-22 lead at intermission and a 58-38 advantage entering the fourth quarter before extending the lead in the fourth for a 71-44 victory.

Adam Barrett scored four of the Indians' first quarter points with five Indians putting points on the scoreboard in the second quarter, including Boone Moss leading with six and Barrett again scoring four.

The quick and aggressive Lakeview defense also served to send the Indians to the foul line a lot in that second quarter when they sank twelve of fourteen attempts.

Scoring leaders by quarter the last half included Dallas Manus with seven points in the third quarter, four by Moss in the third, and five by Darringer Barrett in the third and four in the fourth.

Scoring leaders for the game for the Indians were Darringer Barrett and Manus with 11 points each and Adam Barrett and Boone Moss with

10 each while Major Moss contributed 7 assists and Kobe Denton followed with 2.

Monroe - The first quarter at George Walton Academy was a low scoring affair with the Bulldogs taking a 2-0 lead near the five and a half minute mark and forcing a 5-5 tie with a trey at 1:12 before the Indians embarked on the first of two outstanding scoring runs.

At putback basket by Will DeVries and two free throws by Boone Moss in the final 52 seconds of the first quarter got the Indians a 9-5 lead. And this turned out to be the start of a 16-2 run extending to the 4:15 mark of the second quarter for a 21-7 Indian lead and they appeared to be on the way to an easy victory.

But not so fast. Just as quickly as they had struck gold, the Indians went ice cold, failing to score again in the quarter as the Bulldogs reduced the margin to 21-12 by intermission.

A putback basket by

Adam Barrett just twelve seconds into the third quarter had the Indians ahead 23-12 but the scoring woes would return as the Bulldogs added five points for just a 23-17 deficit by the 4:48 mark.

But once again the Indians would strike for a brief but potent 14-0 run the final 3:38 for a 37-17 lead entering the fourth quarter with freshman Zach Davenport involved in every point of the run.

He first assisted his cousins Boone and Major Moss on field goals and then struck for ten points himself, starting and ending his own personal run with treys and adding two free throws and a deuce in between with Major Moss providing two assists.

The Bulldogs opened the fourth quarter on an 8-0 run for a 37-25 deficit but that was as close as they would get as the Indians would close out the 56-35 win on a 19-10 run highlighted by six points by Boone Moss, five by Dallas Manus, and four by DeVries with Davenport putting an exclamation point on his game with a behind the back assist to DeVries.

Boone Moss took the scoring lead with 17 points for

the game with other leaders being Davenport with 12, DeVries with 10, Manus with 9, and Major Moss with 6.

Leaders in assists were Davenport and Major Moss

with 4 each, Manus with 3, and DeVries with 2.

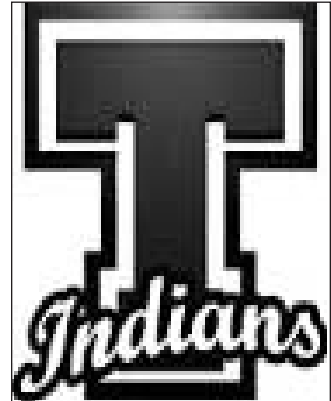
Towns basketball teams to appear in next week's Region 8-A tournament

Lady Indians just miss upset at Lakeview, falter at GWA

The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team pulled off a big upset of Commerce, the second place team in Region 8-A a week earlier and came tantalizingly close to an upset of Lakeview Academy, in first place and undefeated in region play, on the Lady Lions' home court last Friday. They fell by just a 47-43 score after losing by a 76-51 score on their own home court just 13 days earlier.

To be fair to the Lady Lions, they were playing without the services of injured senior Schyuler Miller, something the Lady Indians and Indians can well identify with from last year with the loss of Eryn Cochran and Dallas Manus for half of their seasons.

The Lady Lions extended their overall record to 15-6, their region record to 11-0, and their Sub-Region 8-A North record to 6-0 with the win.

Unfortunately, the road weary Lady Indians would not be able to continue their impressive play of late on Saturday at George Walton Academy in Monroe as they fell to defeat by a 45-29 score.

The Lady Bulldogs from Sub-Region 8-A South improved their overall record to 14-7 and their region record to 8-4 with the win.

The Lady Indians saw their overall record fall to 8-15, their region record to 5-6, and their sub-region 8-A North record to 3-3 with the two losses.

Gainesville - The Lakeview Academy Girls seemed to take control of the game until the Lady Indians made a move from near the middle of the second quarter until intermission.

The Lady Lions used a 9-0 run for an 11-3 lead near the end of the first quarter before a Kristen Henson trey got the Lady Indians within 11-6 at quarter's end.

The Lady Lions continued a strong run at the start of the second quarter with a 7-3 run for an 18-9 lead but the Lady Indians rallied with an 11-4 finish for just a 22-20 deficit at intermission with three deuces for six points by Misty Lindemuth and a trey by Karlie Albach highlighting the run.

A Madison Johnson basket less than a minute and a half into the third quarter got the Lady Indians a 22-22 tie but the Lady Lions again came on strong, building a 37-27 lead by the 1:44 mark.

A trey by Jocelyn Byers, giving her five points for the quarter, reduced the Lakeview lead to 37-30 entering the fourth quarter and Byers more than matched a lucky bounce field goal by the Lady Lions for just a 39-33 Lady Indian deficit by the 7:24 mark of the fourth quarter.

A 3-point play by the Lady Lions at the 4:53 mark gave them a 46-36 lead but they would score just one point after that with a trey and free throw by Byers and two free throws by Kirsten Ledford getting the Lady Indians within 46-42 at the three minute mark.

It was a low scoring battle after that as the Lady

Lions' only point in the closing minutes at 1:12 for a 47-42 Lakeview lead was matched by a free throw by Lindemuth at 38.2 seconds for what turned out to be the final Lady Lions margin of victory of 47-43.

Scoring leaders for the Lady Indians were Lindemuth with 13 points, Byers with 12, and Ledford with 4 while Lindemuth also led in assists with 5 and was followed by four other Lady Indians with one each.

Either team could have gained control of the game with better free throw shooting as the Lady Indians sank just 12-of-25 attempts and the Lady Lions just 6-of-15 with two of their late misses being on one and one bonus attempts and both teams going just one for four at the foul line the final 1:12 of the game.

Indian JV's fall at Lakeview Academy and George Walton

A season of difficulty in coming up with victories continued last week for the Towns County Indian JV's Basketball Team but the games continue to provide valuable experience for up and coming players performing without the services of several top notch young players seeing full time varsity action.

They are now using four players—sophomore Darringer Barrett, freshman Zach Davenport, sophomore Kobe Denton, and junior Jake Pyrlik—who see primary duty with the varsity in usually in just one and sometimes two quarters of action in JV games to remain eligible for extensive duty in the later varsity games.

With this being the case, the Indians hung close for the first quarter at Lakeview Academy in Gainesville on Friday, trailing 11-7 after one quarter but seeing the Lions break away for a 34-11 lead at intermission.

The third quarter was another matter, however, as the Indians used the four referenced players together and they included a 21-2 run in reducing a 36-11 Lakeview lead to 38-32 but then 42-32 entering the fourth quarter.

Freshman Cole Ledford started and ended the potent run with treys for six points with other leaders in the rally including Davenport with five points

ter returning from Lakeview Academy to travel more than one hundred miles to Monroe for an afternoon game had an effect on the Lady Indians on Saturday or not can't be determined.

But the Lady Indians fell to an 8-0 deficit by the middle of the first quarter and trailed 10-5 after one quarter and 22-9 at intermission as their shots just wouldn't fall in the basket.

It didn't get much better the last half although they did reduce the Lady Bulldogs' biggest lead of 36-14 by the minute and a half mark of the third quarter a small amount to 37-17 entering the fourth quarter and to 45-29 by game's end.

Leading individual scoring totals by quarter the last half included four points in the third quarter and six in the fourth by Lindemuth and four by Kirsten Ledford in the third.

Lindemuth again led the Lady Indians in scoring for the game with 12 points and in assists with 2 while Ledford followed in scoring with 6 points.
